

Sue Morello Wins In Art

FARMINGTON Sue Morello, senior at North Farmington High School, was a double winner in the annual Crowley Scholastic Art Show.

She entered with hopes of winning third place and receiving a certificate, or second place which awards a key, or perhaps even first place for a blue ribbon.

Thus, she was surprised to learn both the paintings she entered were awarded first place blue ribbons.

Artrain Will Open Festival

PLYMOUTH Although it won't be open to general public view until next Wednesday, April 19, Michigan Artrain will be brought to its Plymouth site tomorrow to set the stage for Kaleidoscope Plymouth's first spring arts festival.

The rolling gallery which is a project of the Michigan Arts Council will be brought here at the close of an appearance in Fenton by the C&O Railroad and will be accommodated on the siding at the C&O freight depot on Starkweather.

It will be open to the public April 19 through May 6, an 18-day stay that is the longest on its statewide schedule.

The train's early arrival will permit a thorough cleaning and the checking of all electronic equipment before it becomes Plymouth's feature attraction of a festival involving business, civic and school groups throughout the area.

A PREVIEW showing has been scheduled for Sunday afternoon for an estimated 250 persons who have had a direct hand in aiding Kaleidoscope Plymouth in organizing its program.

Their walk-through of Artrain's exhibits will be followed by a reception in the C&O freight house. The Plymouth High School stage band will entertain.

State, C&O, city and township officials will join with members of the Kaleidoscope committee in official opening ceremonies. Following the reception and tour the guests will join those attending the Plymouth Symphony concert at 4 p.m. in the high school auditorium. This occasion will be marked by introduction of a special Artrain composition from the pen of Robert Jones, composer-in-residence at Schoolcraft College.

MEANWHILE, in the final days of the week the finishing touches will be put on the Artrain site.

Dateline Outdoors

Interested in owning and operating a prime campground? With parks getting more crowded, private campgrounds are one of Michigan's growingest businesses.

A campground seminar is scheduled for today (Wednesday) at 7 p.m. in the auditorium of the Ford

Division office building on Southfield Road and Rotunda Drive in Dearborn.

Any interested person may attend, according to Don Juchartz, director of Michigan State University's cooperative extension service in Wayne County.

Seminar topics will include expected profits, growth trends and services that aid in profit-making. You'll have a chance to ask questions.

With Juchartz on the program will be Dr. Eugene F. Dice, MSU special in recreation resource development, and Bruce David, Wayne County public health engineer. There's no charge, and anyone may attend.

The summary of Ontario fishing regulations for 1972 is now available, and several changes of interest to non-resident anglers.

Notably, the Ontario and Minnesota governments have split the 1972 lake trout season in an attempt to safeguard the lake trout fishery in their border waters. The season in district 22 shown in the Ontario regs was open from Jan. 1 to Feb. 29 and will open again from May 13 to Sept. 24.

The split season enables the governments to protect these fish during two critical periods, March, April and part of May, when they are especially vulnerable to the angler, and during the fall spawning period.

Walleye fishermen in some parts of the province get a two-day head start on this early member of the perch family as the season opens on May 13.

Normal opening date in divisions 13, 14 and 15 and northwards is May 15. The one exception is in division 16 (Georgian Bay), where the season will open on May 16. For further information on Ontario fishing, and a copy of

THE NEW RECORD carp for Michigan, a 61-pound, 43-inch trophy speared last June from St. Joseph County's Klinger Lake, is the oldest fish of its species ever taken from the wild in this country, according to fact-finding conducted by the Department of Natural Resources fisheries research biologists.

This careful examination of the carp's scales showed that the true age of the fish was close to 25 years. Everett Gray, of White Pigeon, speared the carp.

Plawecki Asks Vote On Bingo

A Senate resolution introduced by Sen. David Plawecki (D-DeARBORN Heights) would let Michigan voters decide if bingo should be legalized.

The resolution would put a constitutional amendment permitting the game on the ballot in a general election. Plawecki said the provision in the Constitution which now prohibits bingo games is "unreasonable and arbitrary."

"In some communities where the law is strictly enforced, even women who attend a church bingo are liable to prosecution," he said.

"Law enforcement agencies in other communities give more latitude in interpretation of the law, and bingos held by church groups and civic and fraternal organizations are openly accepted."
