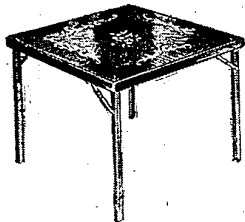

LIBRARY TRUSTEES ATTEND AREA CONFERENCE

Library trustees from public libraries in this area of the state attended a two day conference at Walpoleville, Hardland, on September 12 and 13. The Farmington City and Township Library was represented by Mrs. Ethel Gibson.
