## EXTRA CARE FOR FALL PIGS PAYS BIG DIVIDENDS

The present prospect for a short crop this fall is causing many hogs to go to market when they otherwise might be fed longer or kept over for breeding stock. H. W. Newland, Michigan State college animal husbandry specialist, points out that it is good management to give fall pigs some extra care.

Equipment and housing used for spring farrowing are sometimes inadequate for unpredictable fall weather. If the weather is chilly and the sow is quiet at farrowing time, the farmer may want to remove the pigs to a warm place for a time. If the sow's milk has begun to flow, the pigs should be allowed to nurse every two hours.

About the time fall pigs are old enough to wear the weather may be quite severe. It is important that pigs have warm, comfortable housing after being weaned and also at castration and vaccination time.

For fall pigs to do well, Newland advises, it should be planned so the pigs will come early enough to get out on some good clean pasture for a few weeks before winter sets in. Littering anemia is always a danger if the pigs are confined to cement or wooden floors and are receiving only their mother's milk. The pigs having this common ailment have very pale skin, lack vigor and have a ruff hair coat. This trouble is due to a lack of iron and copper in the little pigs' diet.

If it is necessary that the pigs be left inside for more than three or four days, they should receive the lacking minerals. The easiest way to supply the minerals is to spray or spray the sow's udder daily with a solution of one-half pound of copper per (ferrous sulphate) in one quart of water.



MSC Tests Show Soil Erosion Losses

Rains during September gave visible proof of the value of cover crops at the Michigan State college Agricultural Experiment Station, reports A. H. Mick, soil science specialist, who conducted the tests.


The fields tested had already been well saturated with rain when a total of 3.3 inches of rain fell on the plots. There was little chance for the soil to absorb moisture. A field planted to alfalfa, seeded in oats this spring, soaked up 0.2 of an inch of the rain but had little erosion of soil.

A recently tilled corn field lost the entire 3.3 inches of moisture. This run-off carried approximately one ton of soil per acre with it. Ninety-three per cent of this residue lost was silt and clay, the most productive parts of the soil.

Ample cover crops, such as rye, seeded in the fall will protect sloping fields against erosion.
