Although there was no scoring in the third quarter, Farmington had the ball on Keego's six yard line near the close of the period. Again Keego's line put up an air tight defense and Farmington was forced to give up the ball on downs. Keego kicked out as the period closed.

On the first play of the fourth quarter, Fred McLean, Falcon quarterback, shot a rifle pass to John Greco, who drove over for a touchdown. Packard placed kick for the extra point and Farmington took the lead 9 to 7. Farmington kicked off and Keego, on straight line plays plus a 15 yard punt against Farmington, drove to the Falcon 4 yard line. O'Shaughnessy went over for the second time for Keego and the kick for the extra point was good. Keego taking the lead again 14 to 9. With only 3 minutes left to play in the game Farmington began to move. On a series of passes the Falcons swept down the field into Keego territory. Greco, on a beautiful run, carried the ball to the Keego one yard line behind excellent blocking. But again Farmington was unable to break through Keego's line and they lost the ball on downs. While time was running out, Keego took over and the game ended Keego Harbor 14 - Farmington 9.
