LOCAL RECRUITING
STATION MAY
GIVE OUT MEDALS

World War II veterans of Farmington, who have been authorized by the War Department to wear the Victory Medal or the American Defense Medal, may now obtain the medal at the local Army Recruiting station, at 53½ W. Huron St., Pontiac, Michigan. It was announced recently by M/Sgt. J. D. Carpenter, NCO-in-charge.

Although several million veterans have earned the right to wear one or both of these medals, M/Sgt. Carpenter explained, the medals have only recently been coined by the United States Mint, and general distribution has not as yet been made. Veterans awarded this honor or have worn the ribbon bar which ordinarily substitutes for the medal on all occasions except formal ceremonies.

Army veterans may apply for the medal in person or by letter. Those applying in person are advised to bring with them their original discharge certificate, or a suitable authenticated statement of service issued by the War Department.

Those veterans who apply by letter are advised that their letter to the Army Recruiting Station must be accompanied by a photostatic or notarized copy of either the discharge certificate, or a suitable War Department record, as described above.

Veterans having any questions as to their right to receive the medals may call at the Army Recruiting Station for necessary information, stated M/Sgt. Carpenter.

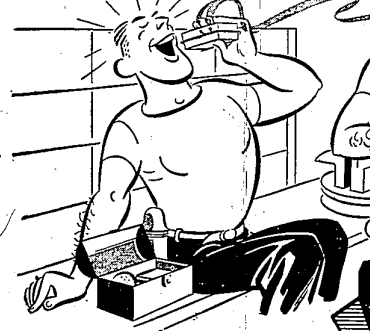

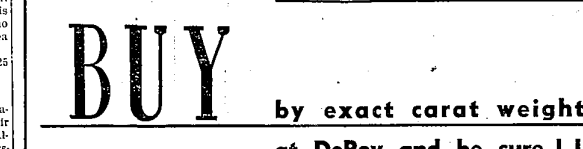

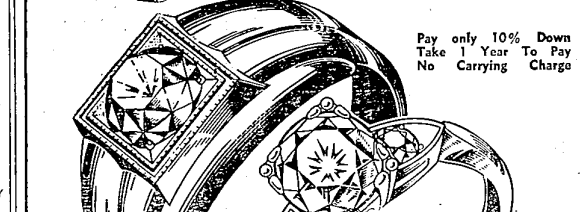
