

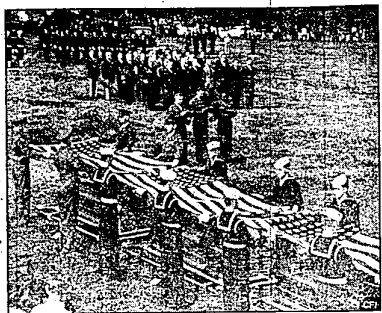
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MILITARY HONORS RENDERED 20 WAR DEAD

Dear Mr. Editor:

I would like to bring to your attention a dangerous condition created on the Farmington Cut-Off due to the fact that the District school bus makes a stop to pick up and discharge children at a point known as Randall Street, which happens to be at the foot of a hill and seriously limits oncoming traffic vision.

It is understood that in bad weather this school bus cannot and does not turn off on the shoulder but remains on the pavement where it is a menace to traffic traveling at high rates of speed and that although the law requires traffic to stop when this bus is picking up or discharging, it is universal that traffic continues on, thus creating a further hazard.

Obviously, most of the oncoming traffic cannot see this bus in time to make a safe stop and it is a great wonder that more accidents have not occurred under these circumstances.

It is further understood that commercial travelers most familiar with this territory, particularly those on the milk and bread routes, have many times commented on the dangerous situation created by this school bus.

on April 14, 1947, Mr. O. E. Dunckel, superintendent of the school, changed the bus stop to the top of the hill, thus putting the bus in full view of approaching traffic, but that this fall the stop has been reverted to Randall Street, or the bottom of the hill.

Many of the parents in the community have taken up this matter with the State Police Post and with Mr. Dunckel, but with no action resulting.

It seems to me that this problem is one for the attention of Mr. Ziegler, the State Highway Commissioner, and Dr. Elliott, our Superintendent of Public Instruction, together with Mr. Leonard, head of our State Police.

It is difficult to understand why local authorities who are charged with the duty of protecting lives and property, have failed to correct this situation long ago.

I would like to bring this matter to the attention of the public through the columns of your paper.

Playing Cards Introduced

While there is evidence as far back as 500 A.
