Milk Products Provide Very Complete Protein Scientific activity during the war has resulted in new emphasis on the value of the protein found in milk and many milk products.

In study of proteins, scientists have found that proteins are made up of amino acids. Certain of these amino acids are known as essential amino acids because they are indispensable to animal life and growth and cannot be manufactured within the body. Hence, they must be included in the diet.

When a protein contains all the amino acids essential to life and growth of an animal it is known as a complete protein.

Lactalbumen, one of the proteins found in whey and many other products is a complete protein. Amino acids, produced from the lactalbumen of cheese whey, were used to save the lives of thousands of starving people in Europe at the close of the war. These people were so badly undernourished they could not digest enough food to regain their strength. The nourishment of amino acids, which require no digestion and are readily absorbed into the blood stream and tissues, saved their lives.
