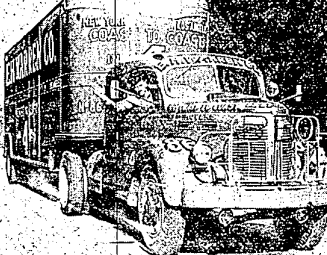

needs, and still lighten the taxpayers' burden, why shouldn't we do it? All it will do is "ask" a couple of billions of the "asking price" of six billion dollars, the estimated amount required by the Marshall plan for its first year of operation.
That is the way to help the little fellow, say Republicans, and also stimulate production by taking some of the burden off the big farmer.
You may have read the report "Taxes and the Budget: A Program for Prosperity in a Free Economy," a document issued by the non-partisan, non-profit Committee for Economic Development. This group employs a large staff of experts who study governmental problems and report on them at frequent intervals.
There is much in this latest report to give aid and comfort to the taxpayer school, but it also contains the warning that "it is not necessary or desirable to make final decisions about the 1948 tax program at this time. It will be necessary early next year. At that time, it will be possible to get a clearer picture of the expenditure outlook ahead and of the degree of inflationary pressure which then exists."
But the question of "inflationary pressure" and how to ease it are already a highly political one. Both parties realize that they have to grab the reins if they are going to get credit for guiding the country out of a boom-bust cycle.

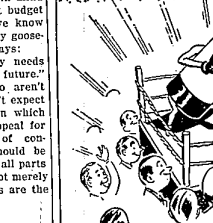
When President Truman revealed the fact that he intended to use the emergency session of congress convening November 17, not merely to consider aid to Europe, but also to ponder a program for lowered prices, to pass the "apple cart" as a Republican said to me. An agreement had been reached to give priority to aid to Europe. Senator Taft, boss of the Republican policy committee, immediately made a reassuring statement that he felt the question of emergency aid and possible preliminary legislation on the Marshall plan could and would be satisfactorily taken care of by December 15. He didn't say what else, if anything, he had in mind for the boys on the hill to handle. But he did assure them they would be home well before the Christmas holidays.
Then came the Truman announcement that efforts to check inflation would be considered on a par with the aid-to-Europe plan. He said the two were closely interwoven because if the dollar continued to shrink, the purchases of supplies couldn't be stretched to meet the need.
After that Taft lost little time in tossing any implied bipartisan program for the congressional session to the winds. If Truman was to include consideration of a domestic economy program, all bets were off. "All of the policies of the present administration," said Senator Taft, were so bad he couldn't "go along with them."
And so the bipartisan apple cart was upset.
What is going to happen is decidedly hazy at this writing.
With bipartisananship out of the window, perhaps a little look at non-partisanship might be of some interest. The Committee for Economic Development (and bear in mind it warns us we can't cut budget reduction chickens until we know how many more inflationary goose-eggs have hatched) says:
"The American economy needs tax reduction in the near future. But these gentlemen, who aren't running for office and don't expect to be, add this observation which may not have a strong appeal for vote-conscious members of congress: "Attention should be given to urgent reforms in all parts of the tax structure, and not merely in cuts where the burdens are the most obvious."
Water to Fight Fires
