That Christmas cards be sent first-class where there is any possibility that the address may be incorrect or incomplete, since only envelopes bearing a 3-cent stamp have forwarding privileges.

Stressing the need for complete and accurate addresses, he pointed out that thousands of cards and packages are days late arriving every Christmas season, or end up at the dead-letter office, because of insufficient addresses. He emphasized that zone numbers should be included whenever available to speed delivery.

Christmas cards can be handled more readily if they are tied in bundles, with all the envelopes facing the same way and the stamps in the same corner. Progressive mailings over a period of several days even out the work at the Post Office, he said.

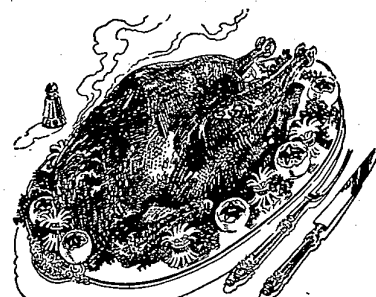
