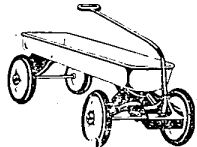

SCHOOL HOUSING

The Noble Parent Teachers Association sponsored a special meeting for parents and residents of their school district last Wednesday evening.

Superintendent of Schools O. E. Dunckel and School Board members Paul R. Schreiber and D. Gerald Domes were present at the meeting, and showed sketches and plans for the proposed new buildings in the Farmington Township School District.

After the proposed building program had been outlined, those present asked questions concerning the housing situation, and what might be the outcome if new buildings were not provided. The only possible solution, if the building program is defeated, would be half day sessions for all students, as the men explained no additional housing facilities are available unless some are constructed, and it was not advisable to continue to use some of the present basement rooms that have been put into use.

The Noble P.T.A. feels that every citizen attending the meeting gained a much clearer understanding of the situation, and can better appreciate the problems that face the school Board. They wish to thank Mr. Dunckel, Mr. Schreiber and Mr. Domes for attending the meeting and explaining the school housing problem to them.

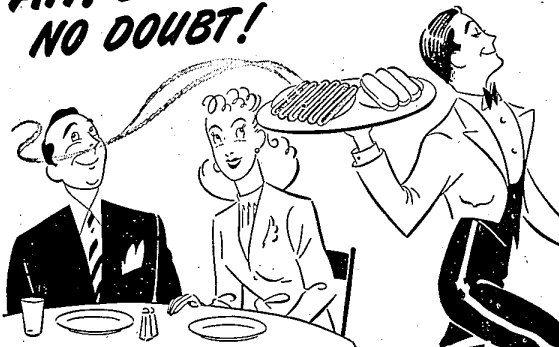

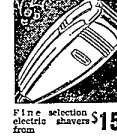
