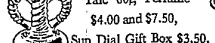

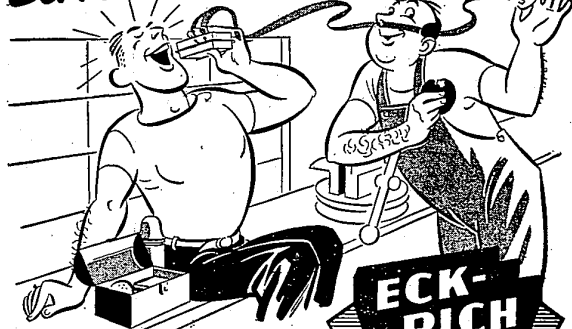
Attends Conference
