PARKING DISCUSSED The commission devoted considerable time to the discussion of the parking situation within the city. Several possible solutions to the problem were brought up, and it was decided that some definite steps in improving the parking facilities for the City of Farmington should be taken now.

Final payment on the contract with Chris Drake for sewer construction and repair was approved, and also payment in the amount of \$3,372, to Fattore Company, for construction of new water mains along Power Avenue.
