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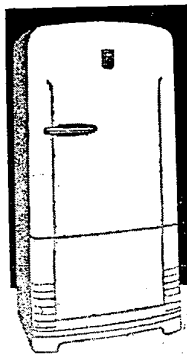

VETERAN OPPORTUNITIES — AIRPORT COMMUNICATORS FOR DUTY IN ALASKA

The Civil Aeronautics Administration has openings for 200 untrained single men as Aircraft Communicators in Alaska, at starting salary of \$3305 a year, it was announced recently by the Director of the Civil Aeronautics Administration.

Successful applicants will be assigned to the 45 Airways Communications Stations operated by the Civil Aeronautics Administration in Alaska for the safety of civil and military flight.

The men selected will be in line for eventual promotion to higher grade jobs paying up to \$5656 a year. Additional earnings are possible in all grades through authorized time beyond the 40 hour week and through the 10 per cent night differential.

Basic qualifications for the jobs are the ability to transmit and receive International Morse Code at a minimum speed of 30 words per minute; to touch typewrite at 35 words per minute; and 18 months of Aeronautical Communications experience or an acceptable equivalent in education and experience.

Applicants other than veterans must be between the ages of 18 and 40 and in good health, particularly with regard to hearing, vision, and speech.

Five weeks of orientation training will be given to the appointees at the Civil Aeronautics Administration, Aeronautical Center, in Oklahoma City before they are sent to an Alaskan Post. They will be expected to remain in the Government Service in Alaska for at least 12 months following appointment.
