William L. Shirer to Address Michigan Newspaper Editors

LANSING—William L. Shirer, famous author and newspaper columnist, will address Michigan newspaper editors and publishers at the 80th Anniversary Convention of the Michigan Press Association, Inc., Friday, Jan. 23, at Lansing.

Mr. Shirer is the author of "Berlin Diary" and "End of Berlin Diary." He will speak at the anniversary dinner Friday evening on the Marshall plan and the postwar problem of Europe.

The kickoff speaker Friday noon will be Blair Moody, Washington correspondent of the Detroit News, who recently returned from a reporting tour of the United Kingdom, Germany, France, Holland, Belgium, Denmark, Sweden, Austria, Czechoslovakia, Greece, Italy, and Switzerland.

Governor Kim Sigler and other elective state officials will appear at a "State of Michigan Press Conference" following the Saturday luncheon, Jan. 24. State officials will answer questions on public affairs, as presented by editors.

The "All-Michigan Dinner," an annual event, will be held Saturday evening. The University of Michigan Men's Glee club, comprising 60 members, will present a concert. Art Brice, harmonica, will entertain. Nate Fry and his seven-piece dance band and girl vocalist will provide music for dancing. The menu will feature choice Michigan-grown food.

The rising cost of producing newspapers, together with other problems of business management in 1948, will be discussed by newspaper publishers at round-table sessions Friday afternoon and Saturday morning. Philip Weiss, chairman of the Michigan State Labor Relations Board, will preside. Limestone the Scavenger

Limestone is used in steelmaking as well as in the manufacture of pig iron. The limestone is pushed by machine through the doors of the open hearth furnace, and the long arm then rotates, emptying the limestone into the hearth. The limestone melts and forms a slag which floats on top of the molten metal in the furnace. Slag is a scavenger, it helps to purify the metal by removing the impurities which the blast furnace left in the pig iron. Most of the carbon in the metal is removed as a gas after combining with the air in the furnace. Through other chemical reactions the slag absorbs silicon and other impurities which may be present.

Volts, Amperes and Watts

The three units, volts, amperes and watts, measure electrical activity. Volts are a measure of current, and the power received. It is therefore correct to say that watts burn, since the burn is caused by the power at the point of contact. The statements that volts cause shock and amperes kill is a little too simplified, since the amperes enter into shock and electrocution. The volts (pressure) combine with the resistance of the body to determine how much current will flow, but the path taken through the body has a large influence on the damage produced.

Valuable Fur Animal

The pine marten, also called American sable by virtue of its close relationship to the rare and valuable sable of the Old World, is much sought by a few hardy trappers in the higher mountains of Canada. The marten has a body about the size of a slender house cat, and like other members of the weasel family, to which it is affiliated, it has short legs. The tail is bushy and the head broad, tapering sharply to a pointed nose. It is rich golden-brown in color except for a vivid orange patch on the throat and chest. Trappers work the skins into scarves and neckpieces or occasionally use them as trimming for high quality coats and wraps. Marten fur usually sells for two or three times the price of mink.
