COUNTY'S RURAL PROPERTY SHOWS HUGE VALUATION

Farm property in Oakland County is now worth more than \$47,625,000 and rural homes here and throughout the state are in the best condition in history, according to a report just released by the Title Council of America.

More than 86 per cent of farm dwellings in Michigan and the North Central states are in excellent condition or need only minor repairs as painting or general maintenance, the report revealed. Only 69.9 per cent were in good repair in 1940. The report was based on Bureau of the Census surveys.

"The rise in farm incomes and property values since 1940 has been accompanied by a great increase in the number of rural homes equipped with such modern conveniences as electric lights, tiled baths and showers and running water," said F. B. Orman, chairman of the Council's residential construction committee.

Electricity, for instance, has gone into hundreds of thousands of rural dwellings in this state and others in the North Central area since 1940, Orman noted. More than 65 per cent of such farm homes now have electric lights, in contrast to 39.4 per cent in 1940.

More than 33 per cent of rural dwellings in the North Central area today have running water, and 22 per cent have private baths, according to the Title Council report. In 1940, 17.3 per cent had running water and only 11.3 per cent private baths.
