memorial remains a shrine for all

before that almost living replica
warmed to life out of cold marble
by the inspired hand of Daniel
Chester French.

It lives as the spirit of Abraham
Lincoln lives.
To the little child beside the ca-
feteria, except for her mother's
tears there was no mourning in
that moment. Only something so-
lemn, something important, some-
thing that touched old and young
alike because it had in it the
comic rhythm of the epic, and, as
well, the simple, soul-touching mel-
ody of the folk song.

And I wonder if there was not
some intangible, some elemental
force because it had in it the

cans the assurance that his spirit,
especially in these times when evil
gods make their black magic to be-
muse the minds of men, is not dead,

by Johnson that Fire and Extended
coverage insurance be placed
through the Kenneth Loomis Insur-
ance Agency of Farmington, Michi-
gan, to cover property on the North-
West corner of Farmington Road
and Grand River Avenue, Farm-
ington, Michigan, known as the Town
Hall property in accordance with
the decree issued on March 3, 1939
by the Oakland County Circuit
Court which stated that the City of
Farmington has an interest equal to
15 per cent of said property. The
rate to be approximately \$11.00 per
thousand for three years and the
amount of coverage to be deter-
mined by appraisal and agreed upon
with the Farmington Township
Board.

NATIONAL GUARD
COMMISSIONS NOW
OPEN TO ALL GRADES

A policy of direct appointment of
second lieutenants to the National
Guard of qualified former enlisted
men of all grades has been an-
nounced by Major General Kenneth
P. Cramer, chief of National Guard
Bureau.

Former enlisted men having a
minimum of six months of service
in the Army of the United States
between December 7, 1941 and
June 30, 1947, are now eligible for
direct appointment as second lieutenants
in the National Guard if they
meet the following requirements:

1. They are graduates of an ac-
credited college or university where
no advance Reserve Officer Train-
ing Course was given or, if it was
given, their period in school before
graduation was too short to permit
them to complete the ROTC course.
2. They are 21 years old and
have not passed their 25th birth-
day at the time of appointment in
the Guard.

Commissions as second lieutenants
in the National Guard are also
open to advance ROTC gradu-
ates without previous military serv-
ice.

Hitherto, direct appointments
were limited to eligible warrant
officers and enlisted men of the
first three pay grades.

Interested veterans should in-
quire at any Army or write to the
Adjutant General's Office, Cap-
itol Savings & Loan Building, Lan-
sing, Michigan.

The time in which partially dis-
abled combat wounded veterans of
the Army or Air Force may enlist
has been extended indefinitely by
each Department.

The Army and Air Force also
have opened enlistments to partially
disabled combat wounded World
War I veterans of the Navy, Mar-
ine Corps, or Coast Guard. Such
enlistments previously having been
reserved for Army and Air Force
personnel.

Eligibles must possess, or be
trainable in certain critically need-
ed skills, and must certify physical
requirements to be enlisted in grade
held at time of discharge if service
was in Army or Air Force, or in
equivalent pay grade if service was
in the Navy, Marines or Coast
Guard. Partially disabled combat
wounded whose last period of active
service was in any branch of the
Armed Forces was in status of a
combat-disabled officer, warrant offi-
cer or flight officer, may be enlist-
ed in Grade One, provided enlistment
is accomplished on or before
June 30, 1948.

Disability compensation or Purple
Heart awards are not necessarily
a prerequisite for enlistment in the
Regular Army or Air Force under
the new order (WD Pamphlet 12-10).

The individual must be a
"battle casualty," defined as a per-
son who suffered wound(s) or in-
jury during combat as result of
enemy action.
