At the time it was proposed the Board was preparing for the special election and decided to table the question until later. Gerald Domes proposed that the question be reopened. He moved that three precincts be established, one at the Bond School, one at the Noble School and one at Farmington.

It was pointed out that three sets of registration books would have to be set up and three separate election boards appointed. The purpose of the proposal was to make it easier for outlying areas of the District to vote. Paul Schrieber seconded the motion.

ELECTION DATE SET
The Board unanimously passed a motion setting the date of the annual school election for the second Monday in June. Last year the annual election and meeting was held the second Monday in July. The purpose for holding the meeting in June is to encourage a larger turn-out at the polls.

The Board adjourned until Monday, February 16, when opening of sealed bids for the sale of the Township School District bonds will be held. The meeting will be held at 5:00 p.m. in the office of the Superintendent at the Farmington High School.

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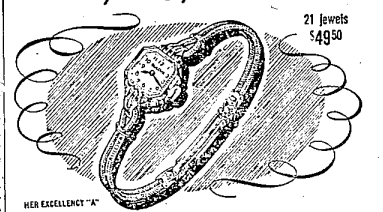
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
