## REGISTRATION NOTICE SPECIAL ELECTION MONDAY, APRIL 5, 1948

To the Qualified Electors of the Township of Farmington, County of Oakland, State of Michigan:

Notice is hereby given that in conformity with the "Michigan Election Law", I, the undersigned Clerk, will, upon any day, except Sunday and a legal holiday, the day of any regular or special or primary election, receive for registration the name of any legal voter in said Township, not already registered, who may apply to me personally for such registration. Provided, however, that I can receive no names for registration during the time intervening between the Twentieth day before any regular, special or official primary election and the day of said election.

The last day for General Registration does not apply to persons who vote under the Absent Voters' Law.

A. 1945, from 8 o'clock a.m. until 8 o'clock p.m. for the purpose of reviewing the registration and registering such of the qualified electors in said Township as shall properly apply therefor.

### SYMPHONY GIVES FINAL SEASON CONCERT

Music lovers attended the last symphony concert of this 1947-48 season Thursday and Friday evening, February 26 and 27, at the Music Hall.

The thought of parting always brings a little sadness to the audience, many of whom have presented throughout concerts during the fall and winter.

The honored guest soloist of the evening was Georges Miquelle, principal of the cello section. He performed with equally great technique and artistry Dvorak's "Concerto for Violin Cello and Orchestra in D Minor", long a favorite with cello virtuosos.

There is no need to say that Mr. Miquelle, who has been a member of the Detroit Symphony for many years, received a rousing ovation from the house, and retired only after many curtain calls.

Dr. Krueger chose a singular program for the closing concert. It opened with the "Overture to Egmont", by Beethoven, indeed a joy to the ear. Following the intermission, Dr. Krueger delivered his annual farewell speech, and said, "Au revoir till next year." He announced that the symphony will take a southern tour during the coming spring months.

Brahms' "Symphony No. 4 in E Minor" climaxed the memorable evening. It is a noble work, typical of the strong, magnetic character of its composer. After the last note died away, and the applause had come to an end, your correspondent went backstage to congratulate and talk with Dr. Krueger, who is without a doubt, a great man and a fine musician. ### EDITORIAL CIVIL RIGHTS

The President's civil rights bill, now before Congress, is one of the important legislative efforts of the year.

Civil rights caused our forefathers to emigrate to America. Attainment of civil rights was the goal of the Revolution. The French Revolution, the two World Wars, all had their roots in the denial of civil rights.

Yet, in this nation today there are factions who will fight to the last ditch the extension to the negro of his civil rights, even his right to protection by the law. These factions are called Conservative. Retrogressive would be a better name.

The fourteenth and fifteenth amendments are attempts to bestow upon the negro at least political equality. These amendments were thought to be guarantees of civil rights to the Negro.

However, ways have been found to circumvent these laws. They have loopholes which are considerably the worse for wear. Voting requirements designed to exclude negroes and poor whites are common.

There are other factors to the race question which may not need quite so radical a solution as the present bill proposes. Segregation, for instance. The two races do not have enough in common to merit general fraternization. We believe
