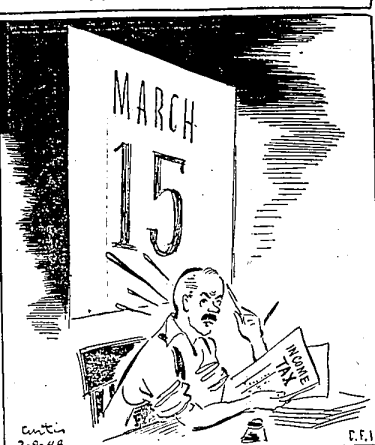

Schism Of Dixie Democrats Could Wreck Party Hopes

A political year may be pretty hard on business, international affairs and persons who expect congress or the President to take some highly important controversial action which might scare away votes — but, if you can stand the sidelines dodging the brickbats which each side hurls at the other, a political year is lots of fun.

One thing that is as interesting to the casual observer as workmen excavating a cellar, a sandlot baseball team, a fire or a dog-fight, are the quadrennial "party splits" which threaten (several months before the convention) to render the big parties in twain.

They usually end the same way — both splinters singing Sweet Adeline, and cursing the other party in perfect harmony.

On the surface the recent row between the southern Democrats and the White House looks like one of those affairs. There is no doubt that the southerners are good and mad. And by all their standards they have every right to be. So there is no telling what might happen! But the fact remains that the Democratic voters in the north can vote either Republican or Democratic, just as they please. In fact, the colored population really has more freedom than the rest of the electorate because it has no tradition of following a strict pattern.

A Democrat, however, if he lives in the South and if he is to remain in perfect harmony.

That wasn't Henry Wallace speaking. Nor Democratic national headquarters.

That was Republican Sen. Wayne Morse of Oregon. Morse assailed "the conservative leadership of his party" that it was too "timid" to score reaction in the Democratic party.

I already have discussed Wallace and his third party "split". There are those who think it of so little importance that it can be ignored. Some now are predicting that before the election, Wallace will be granted some concession, some advantage, and will come out for Truman for president. I wouldn't go so far, but I have heard the prediction in more than one quarter.

Republicans are supposed to welcome Wallace to the race, and to count on him to cut down the Democratic vote to something at most insignificant.

"Let me quote Senator Morse on that subject, as his words appeared in an article in the February issue of the Progressive Magazine. Morse says that Wallace mustn't be taken too seriously, but that he mustn't be ignored either. He adds: "Let my Republican party never forget that there are not enough Republicans to elect a Republican president, nor enough Democrats to elect a Democrat as president. Fortunately there are not enough fellow-travelers to elect Wallace."

TWENTY FIVE YEARS AGO (March 9, 1923)

Celebrate Founding of Farmington

At a regular meeting of the Groves-Walker Post No. 346 of Farmington, formal action was taken towards preparations for a celebration to commemorate the founding of Farmington, which will take place next year. Early action was taken because the legion is aware of the tremendous amount of work necessary to put on the centennial with appropriate ceremonies similar to the way the first settlers did when entering the new country. The Legion further decided to carry out the usual Gala day activities again this year, only to make it larger and better than the previous year.

TEN YEARS AGO (March 10, 1938)

Hit Double Parking on Grand River

Farmington motorists are asked not to be alarmed Saturday if officers request them not to double park along Grand River Avenue. This action is being taken for safety and convenience and to make good an agreement the City made the State Highway Department to allow no double parking along the street, a state and national highway. The agreement was made when the Highway Department improved the street some time ago.

Residents of Side Streets Ask for Traffic Control

For the first time in the history of Farmington, and possibly in the history of Michigan, residents of a side street have asked for some sort of traffic control. Persons living along Power-north of Grand River Monday night sent a letter to the City Commission asking that a stop light or speed limit signs be installed at the corner or near the corner of Power and Shawwassee.

FIVE YEARS AGO (March 11, 1943)

Commission Asked To Get New Fire Alarm System

The regular meeting of the Farmington City Commission was held Wednesday evening. Ned Walker, district manager of the Michigan Bell Telephone Company, was present at the meeting to discuss with the Commissioners the advisability of working out some other system for receiving fire calls rather than having the telephone operator start the alarm, as is being done at present. Mr. Walker pointed out that Farmington is one of the few communities of its size in the State still using this system for fire alarm. He stated that the telephone company feels that it can no longer adequately serve the community in this capacity, and is asking to be relieved of the duty.

Farmington High School has been chosen by Ray G. Wood, Regional Director of the Navy College Training Program V-12, as one of the centers in which qualifying tests for this program will be administered.
