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MISSIONARY
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BAPTIST CHURCH

Miss Eva Shepard, missionary to the Belgian Congo, will be guest speaker at a Missionary Rally in the First Baptist Church on Thursday evening, March 18, according to the Rev. Fred B. Fisher, pastor of the church. Miss Shepard served at the stations of Vonga and Moanda in the Congo since 1927 under the Woman's American Baptist Foreign Mission Society of the Northern Baptist Convention. Now on tour in this country, she expects to take further language study in Belgium before returning to the foreign field.

Following training at Eastern Baptist Theological Seminary and Alfred University, as well as a year's service in New York City's Booth Memorial Hospital, Miss Shepard directed migrant camps for the Home Missions Council. She found one of the greatest problems on the mission field to be the readjustment of the men who went to foreign lands during the war, and who returned dissatisfied and unable to find their places again in the Congo.

The rally will be sponsored by the Women's Mission Union and the World Wide Guild of the church with White Cross displays by the two women's and two girls' organizations. Service begins at 8 p.m. preceded by a dinner, family style, at 7. The people of Farmington are cordially invited to attend.

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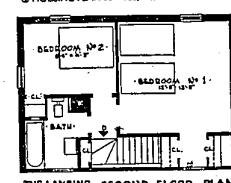
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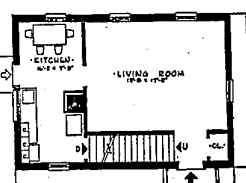
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THE LANSING SECOND FLOOR PLAN

THE LANSING — A tiny house with immense possibilities for gracious living is this beauty. Story picture book home, The Lansing. Although only 17 feet six inches by 26 feet seven inches, it gives the appearance of a much larger house, especially when built with the attached garage. It is rare indeed to find so small a home so attractive and with such well proportioned, generous rooms. It will fit on practically the smallest lot.

Largely of brick, it has a half front of wide, white clapboard or shingles which with white solid shutters gives this little gem a note of distinction.

There is not an inch of waste space. The first floor is divided between living room and kitchen.

The kitchen is large enough for a spacious dining alcove.

Upstairs are two bedrooms and bath with an abundance of closets. Storage space is especially lavish in the master bedroom, which also has three ventilation.

In the planning of this home, the architect has been careful to conform to FHA standards. The house carries the seal of approval of Structural Clay Products Institute and its wiring diagram was prepared by National Adequate Wiring Bureau. Blueprints and specifications may be had for \$7.50 per set from Housing Plan Service, 140 Nassau Street, New York 7, New York.
