denis scientific research board pointed out the technological and scientific progress of this country depends upon one-half of 1 per cent of our population—some 750,000 persons. This small group comprises the trained manpower—the scientists, technicians and engineers upon which the operation and the expansion of our economy depends. And those actually engaged in scientific research and development or teaching comprise a much smaller group within this pool—only 137,000 persons.

The science talent search and similar projects undertaken to discover and encourage youthful scientific talents are helping to ensure the future security and prosperity of the United States which depend as never before on the rapid extension of scientific knowledge. The scientist is the indispensable warrior, but also because scientific discovery is the basis for progress against poverty and disease.

Ex-G.I.s can forget the budget again this year. In its attempt to trim Mr. Truman's spending, congress makes no allowance for nearly 500 million dollars still unclaimed in terminal leave pay due enlisted men. The President's budget budget set aside only five million dollars for this item, just one per cent of the total possible cost.

or disapproval heard because the members of the boards, bureaus and commissions are serving overlapping terms. They frequently are a law unto themselves.

"The people quite properly expect the governor, the legislature, and other elected officials to be responsible for the operation of the state. The governor of a state, whoever he may be, is popularly considered to be responsible for performance and quality of results, yet under the present system he does not have the authority to fill that responsibility."

"As you may know, I have therefore proposed to eliminate certain offices, to replace them with commissioners responsible to the governor, with the consent of the senate. The governor, in turn, is responsible to the people. If they don't like his policies they have the opportunity of registering a protest at the ballot box. I also proposed the merging of certain other commissions and boards to eliminate overlapping, and thus save money and increasing services."

If the legislature votes to submit Governor Sigler's amendments to the voters next November, it will be more out of courtesy to the head of the party than to any personal enmity of legislators. The governor is asking that the legislature give the jury (the voters) an opportunity to return a verdict. Chances are better than 50-50 that the legislature will do so.
