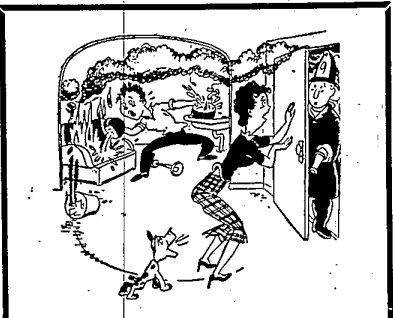


Everlasting Metals
