HARVEY L. BARNES SELECTED FOR NAVAL TRAINING

Harvey L. Barnes, Jr., of 21019 Ontario Street, Farmington, is one of the civilian candidates selected for entry as a regular student in the Naval Reserve Officers Training Corps for the 1943 fall college term.

Of 24,117 candidates who completed the Navy's college aptitude test for the NROTC program, 8,381 received scores which qualified them for further consideration. This figure was reduced by physical examinations, and the records of these civilian candidates who were found physically qualified were submitted to State and Territorial Selection Committees.

The NROTC program gives successful candidates four years of college education at government expense. They may take any course leading to a baccalaureate or higher degree, but must include 24 semester hours of Naval Science, and upon graduation must accept a commission in the Navy or Marine Corps and serve from 15 months to two years on active duty.

Uncle Sam Says
