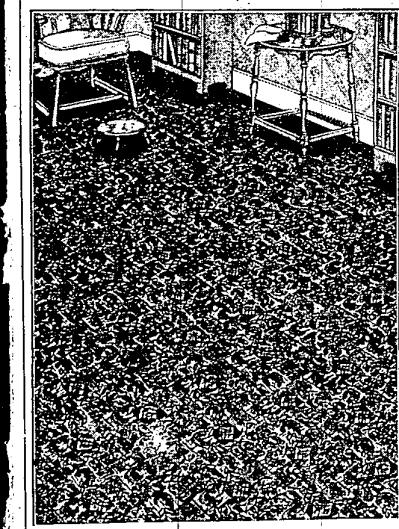


City Manager Plan

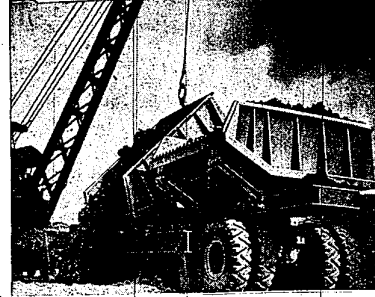
Cub Scouts Bake Sale Is This Saturday

Sheep Parasite Control Urged By Specialist
Stomach worms and nodular worms are the internal parasites that cause the greatest loss in sheep production. R. R. Nelson, Michigan State college sheep specialist, says control of these two parasites will result in faster growing, healthier lambs.
The simplest, and probably most effective means of control, is mixing phenothiazine in the salt for the sheep. The recommended mixture is one pound of phenothiazine with 12 or 14 pounds of salt. This mixture should be made available to the flock at all times and should be protected from the rain and sun. In flocks with no previous worm treatment, the entire flock can be drenched with phenothiazine before being turned to pasture. The dosage from drenching should be one ounce for lambs and one ounce for yearlings and older sheep. Wettable phenothiazine should be used for drenching. Phenothiazine capsules may be used in place of the drench but are more expensive.

NOT ALL WILD FLOWERS SHOULD BE PICKED FREELY

The woods and meadows are now beautiful with Michigan wild flowers. It is said that those people who can see and enjoy simple natural things are happy and contented.
The Farmington Garden Club would like their friends, particularly the boys and girls, to learn to identify wild flowers found in this locality, and to learn to know wild flowers which can be picked freely, and those that should not be picked at all, but should be enjoyed in their natural habitat. The following list may be helpful.
Flowers which may be picked freely include asters, black-eyed susans, ox-eye daisies, butter and eggs, buttercups, cat tails, chloery blue sailor, dandelions, edelweiss, primrose, fire weed, goldenrod, hawk weed, jewel weed, Joe pie weed, sweet william or wild philox, Queen Anne's lace, violets, wild morning glory or bind weed, wild roses, wild sunflowers and yarrow.

Flowers to be picked with care include American lotus, bird's foot violet, blue flag or wild iris, butterfly weed, dutchman's breeches, flowering wintergreen, hare bell, hepatica, lupine, cowslip or marsh marigold, spring beauty, wild lily of the valley, wild geranium or crane's bill, wood anemone and rue anemone.

Flowers which should not be picked at all, but should be left in their natural habitat to be enjoyed there are adder's tongue or trout lily, trailing arbutus, blood root, bottled gentian, fringed gentian, cardinal flower or red lobelia, blue lobelia, columbine, flowering dogwood, ground pine, holly, Indian moccasin, Indian pipe or ghost plant, lady slippers, meadow lily, trillium and pitcher plant.

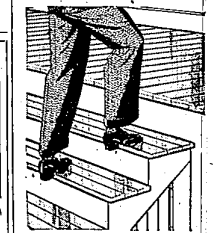
Napoleon Dompierre Home On Leave
