Preventing Tularemia

If people would avoid all contact with wild rabbits, 90 per cent of tularemia would be eliminated, Dr. Robert P. Little, Columbus, Ohio, reported to American Medical Association. The disease is fatal to animals, he says, and one should suspect it if a rabbit or hare seems unusually tame so that it may be caught by hand or if it runs sluggishly when flushed. Cases of tularemia, or rabbit fever, have at one time or another been reported from every state but Vermont. There have been some 18,000 cases reported in the United States, of which 7.2 per cent were fatal.
