Rural Recreation Gains
Rural recreation is on the upswing because rural people are changing their ideas about a desirable balance of work and play, according to M. L. Wilson of the U. S. department of agriculture. "Years ago," he says, "work was one of the things held in highest regard by rural people. They worked hard and upon. It was unheard for a farm family to take a vacation." Today this attitude is changing so that 10 times as many farm families plan and take vacations as did so a generation ago. The extension service in many states now promotes vacation camps for farm women and children. Camping in state and national parks and forests draw more and more farm people of all ages. More and more of the automobile tourists are from county homes. Mechanization and technology are reducing the working hours of American farm families. A two-man farm a generation ago is a one-man farm today. The life and home work of women and children is lighter than ever before, all of which provide time for needed vacations.

'White Collars' Stay
Stability of employment—sticking to one job—is a distinct characteristic of the white collar worker in New York City, according to a study made by Commerce and Industry Association of New York. The average length of service of clerical workers presently employed by the business men of New York City is 8 1/2 years, based on a computation of 52,868 employees of 45 companies in the survey shown. Another section of the compilation shows that of 331 companies studied only 12 gave their employees formal cost-of-living bonuses. Other surveys apparently incorporated cost-of-living adjustments directly into their rate structures.

Physicians Per Capita
If the population of the United States could be geographically arranged that each physician would have an equal number of persons to treat in the event of sickness, the per physician population would be approximately 80. Next to the United States, Great Britain has one physician to 1,850 of its population, while in central European countries there is one physician to each 2,200. There still is a crying need for physicians in rural America.

no charge made for water and during the construction of the homes, since the connection was not reported to the City until the new home was occupied.

Mr. Baker no longer holds his interest, and the City Commission feels an agreement must be made with the Township, under which water customers in the Floral Park section will be charged for the actual amount of water used.

A request from the Farmington Township School District for the extension of water mains 650 feet north on Power Avenue was referred to the city engineer for design and estimate. The city clerk was asked to determine how soon the water service will be needed. This extension is requested to provide city water at the new school site.

City Clerk Henry Moore reported that only one bid had been submitted for furnishing a new police car for the City of Farmington. Since the bid, made by Curt Hall, was acceptable to all the Commissioners, it was voted to order a new Pontiac for the police department. The present police car will be sold.

RECREATION AID VOTED
A letter from Dr. E. W. Wheeler, president of the Farmington Area Recreation Commission was read and the resolution submitted for the formation of the recreation group under the City of Farmington, the Township of Farmington and the Farmington Township School District, was adopted. The commission voted its share of \$250.00 to further the recreation commission program.

Ordinance C-24-48, controlling the licensing and operation of amusement centers in the City of Farmington was given its first and second readings, the third and final reading to be at the regular June meeting of the Commission.

Mayor Deane Hamlin stated that some progress has been made in providing a community parking lot in the city. However, the property at the site is not available, and it does seem that some relief for the parking problem is near.

Glen H. Leland was retained by the City Commission as legal counsel, at \$200.00 per month, April 1, 1948 through December 31, 1948 to revise all City Ordinances, including the City Charter.

Colonel Sam Smith, city building inspector, was present at Wednesday evening's meeting and discussed at length the revision of the City Zoning Ordinance, and Building Code, making several recommendations.

The Commission will hold a special meeting on Thursday evening, May 27, for the purpose of reviewing budgetary requirements for the 1948-49 budget.
