FARM BUREAU ENJOYS MEETING AT KNAPP HOME

The West Farmington Farm Bureau Discussion Group met at the home of Mr. and Mrs. William Knapp on Thursday, June 17, with 14 members, four visitors and ten children present.
A discussion was held early in the evening, with Fraser Hults leading a round table on "Do Our Co-Operatives Serve Their Purpose?" Reports of the group members and Treasurer were read and approved. The secretary stated that the State Farm Bureau is interested in getting reports as soon after meetings as possible, and has offered a \$100 prize to the group coming in first.
A resolution was drafted and passed by the group opposing the control of production on farms.
Wendell Green gave a report on the water supply in this area, as a part of the fire prevention program. He stated that all wells and reservoirs have been located, where one might obtain water in an emergency, and these locations will be marked on maps as soon as the maps can be procured.
An invitation from the Wallied Lake Farm Bureau was received, to join with them for the annual pot luck picnic to be held in July, that is to be held at a committee. The invitation was accepted, and there will be no regular business meeting in July.
Ray Howard gave a report on the Board of Directors meeting, and stated that 1,508 were in attendance at the Grassland Day meeting.
The new fertilizer plant is now ready for operation, and those who would like to do so are invited to make a tour of the plant. Get a group together, and arrange for an early date.
Howard McCracken reported on the new 4-H Club which is being organized in this area, and stated that a meeting will be held on Wednesday, June 30, at Earl Smith's home at Dunrovin Farms. Parents are asked to accompany their children to this meeting in order to lay plans for the new organization.
The date of the August meeting is the third Thursday, as usual, and it will be held at the home of Fraser Hults.
The women enjoyed several games of croquet on the lawn, and everyone participated in an old fashioned weiner roast, which was very much enjoyed.

Notice To Bicycle Owners And Operators

TRAFFIC ORDINANCE NO. C-23-48 PROVIDES:

1. No person who resides within the City of Farmington shall ride or propel a bicycle on any street, sidewalk or highway unless such bicycle has been licensed and a license plate is attached thereto.
2. Effective July 1, 1948, application for license plates shall be made to the Police Department. An annual license fee of Fifty (.50) Cents, shall be paid to the City Clerk.
3. The Following general provisions of the ordinance will be strictly enforced:
(a) No bicycle shall carry more persons than the number for which it was originally designed and equipped. Riding on handle bars or elsewhere than upon the regular and permanent seat is prohibited.
(b) Ride as near the right side of the roadway as possible and not more than two (2) abreast. Racing is prohibited.
(c) Every bicycle shall have a bell or warning device audible for a distance of 100 feet; sirens or whistles prohibited.
(d) Every bicycle shall be equipped with proper brakes.
(e) Bicycles operated at night shall be equipped with proper front and rear lights.
(f) Every bicycle operated on the streets, shall obey the provisions of the Traffic Ordinance.

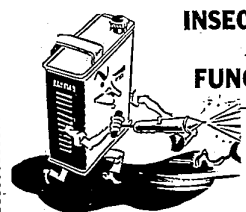
