Notice To Bicycle Owners **And Operators**

ANG OPERATORS

TRAFFIC ORDINANCE NO. C-23-48
PROVIDES:

No person who resides within the City of Farmington shall ride or propel a bleycle on any street, sidewalk or highway unless such bleycle has been licensed and a license plate is attached thereto.

Effective July 1, 1948, application for license plates shall be made to the Police Department. An annual license fee of Fifty (.50) Cents, shall be paid to the City Clerk.

The Following general provisions of the ordinance will be strictly enforced:
(a) No bleycle shall carry more persons than the number

The Following general provisions of the ordinance with exterictly enforces that carry more persons than the number for which it was originally designed and equipped. Riding on handle bars or elsewhere than upon the regular and permanent seat is prohibited.

(b) Ride as near the right else of the roadway as possible and not more than two (2) abreat. Racing is pro-

hibited.

Every bicycle shall have a bell or warning device audible for a distance of 100 feet; sirens or whistles prohibited. Every bicycle shall be equipped with proper brakes. Bicycles operated at night shall be equipped with proper.

Bicycles operated at front and rear lights. front and rear lights.

Every bicycle oprated on the streets, shall obey the provisions of the Traffic Ordinance.
