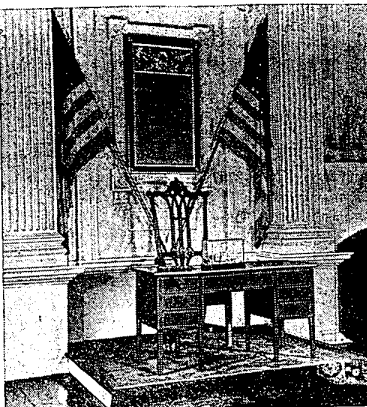

Vacation Highlights

All of Pennsylvania is enthralling, but no spot in all America holds more interest for the teacher or student than grand old Philadelphia. Here you see the desk used by the signers of the Declaration of Independence. It is in hallowed Independence Hall.

Probably no city in these United States appeals more to the teacher or the student than glorious old Philadelphia — "City of Brotherly Love" — where the very earliest of American history was put into motion and where, over many years, the infant country was nursed into strength by its founders. The Liberty Bell is there, of course, and Independence Hall, certainly one of the most hallowed buildings in the country.

Through the early summer Philadelphia is the mecca for thousands of educators, as well as the myriad others who thrill to early history. Washington accepted no more delightful objective for a summer vacation. The city, of course, is the hub about which one finds many other hallowed spots, notably Valley Forge and Gettysburg, and a Philadelphia visit would include these areas.

Philadelphia itself was founded in 1681 by Captain William Penn. Penn himself followed the next year and it was he who laid out the streets and named the city. By 1685, ninety ships had come to the new settlement, bringing 7,200 people. In the period preceding the Revolution, the city outstripped all others in the colonies in education, arts, science, industry and commerce.

The first Continental Congress met in September, 1774 and the second the following year. Here Washington accepted no more command of the army and the Declaration of Independence was adopted. The city was taken by the British in 1777 and occupied for many months. During this period, Washington and the Continental army spent the bitter winter of 1777-78 at Valley Forge, now the Valley Forge State Park, about 15 miles west of Philadelphia. After the Revolution, Philadelphia was the seat of the Federal government and here the Constitution was adopted, and the first met established. Today Philadelphia is literally packed with unforgettable things and places, notably Independence Hall, where you look upon the Liberty Bell and the desk upon which the Declaration of Independence was signed. Immediately joining Independence Hall is Congress Hall, where the first Congress of the United States met and Washington was inaugurated for his second term.

The visitor will want to see LaSalle Street House, one of the earliest brick houses in the city, built by William Penn for his daughter. The house and furnishings are of the period 1700-1730.

Another "must" is Christ Church Cemetery, containing the graves of

also been proposed. Plates, licenses and mechanical inspections would be handled at one location under direct supervision of the State of Michigan through the Secretary of State's office.

One formidable barrier to periodic inspection is the initial heavy investment in equipment to check the automobiles. A substantial appropriation of state money would be needed, and the State of Michigan faces a deficit in the cost fiscal year.

And yet a rise in the new highway accidents, as shown by the 1947 toll, is costing someone — the other driver, now and then — far more in the aggregate than the amount required to buy the inspection equipment.

Here is another problem that affects everybody. Are the savings worth the cost? Michigan State college at East Lansing is a good place to go for the answer to many farm and home problems. Be sure your questions are clearly stated.

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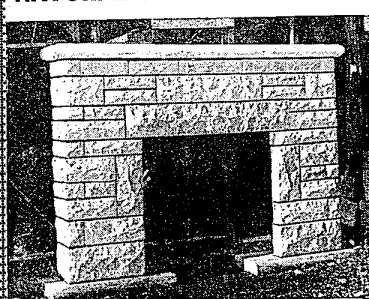

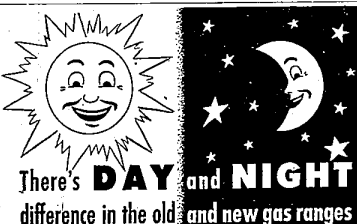

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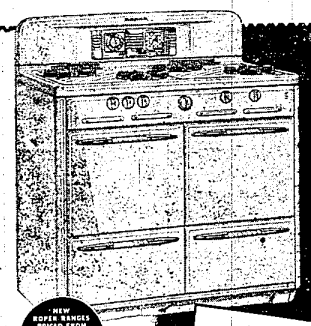
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
