School District be increased to cover costs of janitor service and maintenance. The Board approved the following changes. West of school room, \$1.50 per hour with a minimum of \$2.50. Use of Auditorium, Gymnasium, without stage, \$20.00 and \$30.00 with stage. Charge for dances was set at \$50.00. Fee for use of Gymnasium for rehearsal was set at \$2.50 per hour with a minimum fee of \$5.00. Adult Recreation groups will be charged \$1.50 per hour for use of the Gymnasium with a minimum of \$2.50.
The Board approved a motion to increase maximum salaries for maintenance staff up an increment of \$300 per year over present salary schedule. They will also be paid \$1.50 for extra duty work.

RECREATION PLAN ATTENDANCE GOOD AT CLARENCEVILLE
Clarenceville's Summer Recreation Program swung into its second week with good attendance reported at the Clarenceville, Edgewood, and Central School areas.
Lora Samuels, director of the program, said a basketball league composed of four teams has been organized at Clarenceville, and games are played in the evenings at the high school athletic field. The teams are made up of boys 15 to 18 years of age and older.
The teams are the "Grand River Aces", sponsored by Jim Rau, the Alumnus team the Derrick Coal and Ice team and Jerry Heaphy's team. Samuels said the games are usually played on Wednesday and Sunday.
The Heaphy team won its first game last Sunday by defeating the Aces 11 to 4. The Grand River Aces beat Derrick Coal and Ice 11 to 5 last Wednesday.
Samuels said there were almost 200 fans watching the game last Sunday.
Every morning from 9 to 11 Samuels directs woodworking classes of youngsters from age 8 to through 14, held at Clarenceville High School. Approximately 40 children attend the classes, the director reported.

FARMINGTON BOY INVITED TO ATTEND OCSB BOYS' CAMP
Richard Bowyer, 30404 West 14 Mile Road, Farmington, has been invited to attend the Junior County Sportsmen's Club boys' camp to be held throughout next week at Lake Oakland, Bay Hartington, secretary of the club, said this week.
With the cooperation of the State Conservation Department, OCSB's boys' camp will be on the new public fishing site on Lake Oakland, which has been purchased by the department but not yet developed.
Twenty-five boys from throughout the county have been honored by invitations to the camp. They will enjoy a week of fishing, swimming, games and outdoor studies. Adult counselors will be with them.
At the site, which is just north of Walton boulevard east of Sashabaw Road the OCSB is erecting two large army hospital tents, one for sleeping, the other for cooking and dining. A week-long fishing contest will be held among the boys with awards for largest bluegill, bass and pike to be presented as the camp closes. Softball, horseshoe pitching, fly tying, casting, inspection of the State Fish Hatchery at Drayton Plains, and movies are on the program, Sunday through Saturday. Parents will take the boys to camp next Sunday noon.
A fish fry will be staged by the boys Friday for their dads, to be followed by an evening of fishing. Harrington said "surprise" prizes will be given the father who makes the best catches.
Plans for the camp have been in the making several weeks. At the annual OCSB family picnic past (it was held last Sunday at David R. Wilson Sportsmen's Park, Waterford, with nearly 7,000 attendees) the Junior OCSB boys were notified to get ready for the week's outing. Fred T. Holland, first vice-president of OCSB, will be in charge, with Dr. P. B. Jones, Milton "Probert" Fritz, Augustmann, Thomas Booth, Eugene Allen, Loren Shaw, Bruce Melick, Loren Gowden, Richard Mielke and Jack McGhee on his staff. McGhee, Farmington High School's champion swimmer, will be water instructor.

about the noise and nuisance allegedly created by the company in the operation of its business. The matter was referred to Building Inspector Sam L. Smith for investigation.
Communications were read from the Michigan Department of Health in regards to the sewage disposal problem in the City and Township of Farmington. Mayor Hamilton stated that arrangements were being completed for a meeting of the City and Township officials, together with representatives from the State Department, and the date has been tentatively set for July 26.
A charge of illegal parking lot problem and possible sites for parking lots within the City has been made by Lloyd Gullen; and his report was read.

OBJECT TO BURNERS
Several complaints have been made within the past two weeks concerning the burning of trash in the cans that have been placed in a large area of the city. The cans were provided to give merchants and residents a place to burn papers, but they are apparently being used to burn all kinds of trash and garbage, and the burning has been thrown about them. They have created a serious fire hazard, and are sanitary conditions. It was decided that the Police Department would notify the property owners that the cans must be used properly, or they will be taken away, and each individual will have to find some other means of disposing of his paper and packing.

Commissioner Bagwell moved that a \$5,000 Certificate of Indebtedness, which was due June 1, 1946, be cashed.
It was also moved to increase the salary of William Pauline, caretaker of the Municipal Building, to \$75 per month, effective July 1.
The commission voted to pay the expenses of City Assessor Arthur Loomis to the Assessor's Convention to be held at Mackinac Island.
FIREMEN TO MEET HERE
The Oakland County Firemen will come to Farmington on Friday, July 24, for a regular meeting of their group. All commissioners will attend this meeting and the City voted to provide their share of funds to furnish refreshments for the group.
Commissioner Otto was named to check on a request from City Health Officer, Dr. M. E. Whitehead, that the wading pool be cleaned and filled each day before 10:00 a.m. It was reported that broken bottles and glass about the pool must be removed every day before it is safe for the children to use it.
A request was received for installation of a city sewer on Grove Street. The present sewer was put in by individuals owning property in the area, and is in very bad condition.
Glenn H. Leland was retained by the City as auditor for the coming year.
Commissioner Hatten reported that repair on streets in the city has been about completed, and the roads are in good condition. Sidewalk repair has also been started but because of the shortage of cement it will necessarily be very slow work.
