To the Editor:

For some time the "lack of interest" attitude of the city officials has had me wondering why they run for office. It can't be the remuneration they receive, that is a nuisance. From their activities of recent months, I fail to see where their desire to serve the people of the city could have been the incentive to run for public office.

I won't bother to go back too far, because memories about such things are short anyway. This past week has given several good examples of what I mean.

A short time ago the city fathers caused a new traffic ordinance to be written, at no little cost to the people. It is a good ordinance — if enforced.

Article IV, Section 28 of that ordinance states, clearly and briefly that "no person shall operate or park on any street any vehicle for the primary purpose of advertising." That sound truck running about town last week wasn't doing it to break in a new set of tires.

The city officials approved a request for permission to have a parade of children on Grand River Avenue on Sunday afternoon. Do they know of the flow of traffic on that street on Sundays, or was it that they just didn't think of it? It was not at the commission meeting when approval was granted, but I doubt that much time was given to discussion of that question, nor much thought given to it. The consequences could have been tragic; as it was it was only bothersome to a few hundred motorists trying to get through town.

Some time ago an ordinance was passed by the city commission to the effect that all persons serving food in the City of Farmington must have food handlers' permits. In the consequences could have been tragic; as it was it was only bothersome to a few hundred motorists trying to get through town.

In my opinion, the primary duty of a police department is to preserve law and order and next to that should be a serious concern over the safety and health of the citizens of the city. Some of the rides at the recent carnival had kind around them. Any small child could have walked directly into moving platforms in some cases. Factories are not allowed to let unsafe conditions exist. Why should carnivals?

When any department of city government is lax in fulfilling its duties, the city commission should see to it that personnel in such departments are jogged into activity and made to do their jobs, or be removed from them.

If each commissioner would sincerely ask himself if each question that came up was honestly dealt with and the final decision was definitely for the betterment of the City of Farmington, or service to its citizens, perhaps our commission would do a better job.

I would appreciate a reply in this column from any commissioner who feels he has a satisfactory explanation for these items listed above.

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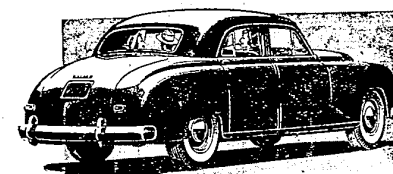
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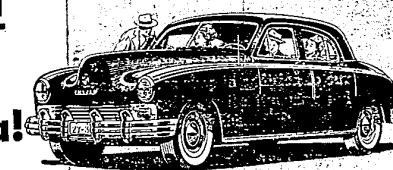
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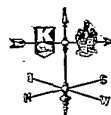
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
