Czech army was anti-Communist.
My informant put it this way: "The air force, many of whose members fought with the R. A. F., is almost entirely pro-Western. If the Reds hadn't drained the tanks of all the planes before the coup, most of them would have flown away." Many did anyway and Czech planes are turning up continually in Western controlled areas of Europe. This occurs in spite of the fact that many of the pilots are former members of the air corps.
But if the Red government cannot trust the air corps, it has even less confidence in the Czech army. It has been necessary to immobilize it.
But the greatest friction caused by partial communication is felt in the nation's economy. Every day of the week, indirectly, because of this, but it can be seen most clearly among workers. Recent figures, which were made available to the public indicate that there is a sharp falling-off in the man-hour productivity. This could be attributed either to conscious sabotage or to a feeling of indifference and resentment caused by reduced pay and restrictions on the union labor movement.
Before the Russians moved in, 75 to 80 per cent of Czechs, at least in the foreign trade was with non-Communist countries. This has been considerably reduced under pressure from Russia, but even now some 60 to 70 per cent of her exports go to Western Europe.

LOCAL KIWANIS TO ATTEND SAULT CONVENTION
Prominent leaders in American and Canadian government will address delegates attending the 1948 convention of the Michigan Kiwanis District September 5 to 8 at Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan.
Ray Eichler, president of the Kiwanis Club of Farmington, said today that Paul Martin, minister of National Health and Welfare for the Dominion of Canada, and Governor Kim Sigler of Michigan had accepted invitations to participate in the annual meeting.
The speaking program also will feature the appearances of Al. R. Cox, Canton, O., business leader; Walter J. L. Ray, prominent Detroit banker, both members of the board of trustees of Kiwanis International, and Ben Dean, Grand Rapids, advertising executive and former president of the community service organization.
The convention will observe International Night Monday evening, September 6, at Fuller Stadium in Sault Ste. Marie with Mr. Martin sharing speaking honors with Governor Sigler, Eichler said. our national defense policy, subject to approval of public opinion here. Pride of National Guard units has deep roots in Michigan communities. Officers are watching with interest the congressional outcome of a move at Washington to put the National Guard under federal control. The feeling of opposition is running high here.
Col. Edward R. Roberts, Senior U.S. Army instructor on duty here, diplomatically pointed out that National Guard divisions were not given "soft jobs" in World War II. The 45th Army Division (Ohio) suffered the second highest casualty rating in the war during its service in Italy and Europe. The 32nd Division (Michigan-Wisconsin) was first in action in the southwest Pacific, while the 20th Division (Maryland and Virginia) were among the first troops to land in Normandy.
The ground units at Graying comprise the 46th Infantry Division. The air units are part of the Tenth Air Force.
On the ground and in the air, Michigan is doing its part to be ready for whatever the future may bring. Camp Graying is a symbol of this preparedness.
