

Calvin Ensemble To Perform Here

The Calvin College Chamber Ensemble will present a concert at 8 p.m. Saturday, April 29, in University Hills Church of Farmington, 26711 Farmington Road.

The 15-member instrumental group is made up of a brass quintet, a woodwind quintet and a string quintet, along with an added clarinetist.

The Farmington Community Arts Council is joining with University Hills Church to sponsor the visit of the musicians from Calvin College in Grand Rapids. The ensemble is making a spring tour of the state.

Conducted by John Worst, the program will include selections by Palestrina, Gabrieli, Debussy, Beethoven, Ibert, Dvorak and Sousa.

Dr. Harold Ellens, pastor of University Hills Church said the public is invited to the concert. There will be no admission charge, and an offering will be taken.

Calvin College is a liberal arts college of the Christian Reformed Church, with which University Hills is affiliated. Its present enrollment is about 5,000.

Rev. Lester Kinsolving's Religion Update

President Nixon should be interested to learn that one of his White House guest preachers - whom he hailed as "one of our great Lutheran leaders" - has now announced:

"We believe that Jesus Christ is the only way to heaven and that all who die without faith in Him are eternally damned."

Nixon's "great Lutheran leader" is the Rev. Dr. J.A. Preus, president of the 2.8 million-member Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod - whose embattled liberals, taking cognizance of President Preus' initials, as well as his methods of "leadership," coined the phrase: "Freedom now - with Chairman Jao!"

Dr. Ehlen, explained Preus in an open letter to the Missouri Synod's membership, was questioned for "considerable time" last Dec. 13, "regarding the existence of angels and a personal devil."

Furthermore, wrote the great Lutheran leader, Ehlen "did not believe certain miraculous events recorded in Scripture in connection with the Exodus had actually taken place."

CONCORDIA'S president, the Rev. Dr. John Tietjen, has defied Dr. Preus' directive that Prof. Ehlen be prohibited from teaching any Biblical courses. Tietjen noted that the limitations on what a professor may teach must be stated in writing at the time of his appointment - according to the denomination's own bylaws.

"If I were to carry out President Preus' directive," observed Tietjen, "I would be responsible for a course of action which - because it bypasses the authority and responsibility of the seminary's board of control, faculty and administration - would have serious consequences for the accreditation not only of this seminary, but of every accredited institution in the Missouri Synod."

At the time of this writing, a team of examiners from the American Association of Theological Schools, the nation's theological seminary accrediting agency, had

arrived on the Concordia campus to investigate the Preus-probe. Their report is due sometime this spring.

In addition to the medieval antics of President Preus, Dr. Tietjen has an additional cross to bear. Because Chairman of the Rev. Robert Preus, is still a member of the Concordia faculty.

That "Brother Bob" may well be behind President Preus' great assault on Concordia Seminary is indicated, among other reasons, by an incident which this writer observed in a hallway just behind the speaker's platform at the Missouri Synod's national convention last summer in Milwaukee.

I CAME UPON Robert Preus even as he was in the act of trying to pressure the elderly convention parliamentary, William Von Spreckelson, of Orlando, Fla.

And just prior to Preus' almost indescribable outburst of rage when he found himself caught in this act, I distinctly recall hearing him say to the parliamentarian: "Regardless of what Jack says..."

"Jack" is the Rev. President J.A.O. Preus, who comes up for reelection in July of 1973 at the New Orleans convention, of a denomination which he has so significantly caused to live up to the familiar nickname of "The Misery Synod."
