Golf bags were presented as prizes to the second and third winners and to the player chosen best local golfer. Peter Bell, who won this award, also received a jacket donated by Love and Campbell, sporting goods store in Detroit, for making the longest drive (235 yards) of the day. Bell did exceptionally well, especially since he has been playing golf for only four months.

Every player in the tournament was given a radio by the RCA Corporation for attending.

Other players in the contest were Robert Aliman, 30, Pennsylvania; designer of ground baseball for the blind; Nick Sotnick, 26, Detroit, vice president of the MDGA and Team; Harry Hunter, 35, Detroit, president of the MDGA, and Mrs. Hunter, 35, Detroit, secretary of the MDGA.

Pottery Cooking Saves
Pottery is one of the greatest economizers of fuel because it retains heat so well. Never use a high fast flame for cooking food in pottery because it's a needless waste of gas and also, in time, cracks the glaze on the bottom. Preheat the pottery utensil with a medium low flame, then as soon as boiling begins, lower the flame to the lowest simmer point to maintain gentle boiling.

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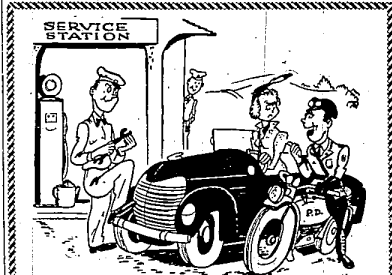
