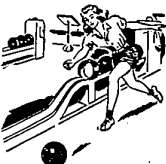

ATTENDS NATIONAL
PHOTO CONVENTION

Angelo Serrano, Farmington, ac-
companied by Ann Serrano, his
wife, is among the thousands of
professional cameramen attending
the 57th Annual Convention of the
Photographers' Association of America
in progress at The Stevens
Hotel, Chicago, Illinois, August 22
to 27.

The Convention, annually one of
the largest professional and trade
gatherings of the nation, acts as a
"clearing house" for the entire pho-
tographic world. Top-flight pho-
tographic artists act as instructors
and demonstrators to clarify cur-
rent day problems and discuss new
trends in the industry.

Highlights of the 1948 Conven-
tion include a tremendous display
of equipment, apparatus and man-
ufacturers' Association of the na-
tion's foremost manu-
facturers; lectures and demon-
strations on portrait and commercial
photography, one of America's out-
standing picture exhibits and nu-

Silo Conditioning
Pays Dividends

A little time taken to put the
silo in good condition will result
in better keeping of the silage ac-
cording to agricultural engineers
at Michigan State College.

The silo should first be cleaned
by scraping off any old silage that
may be adhering to the walls. All
litter at the bottom of the silo
should be taken out.

Air leaks in walls may cause
silage to spoil. Walls should be
carefully examined and small
cracks filled. Melted paraffin ap-
plied with a paint brush is good
for this purpose. Since paraffin is
inflammable when hot, care should
be taken when using it. It should
be brushed into cracks or points
while it is still warm.

In winter months as a warming

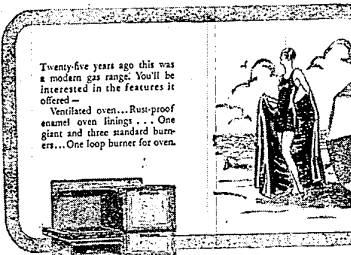
