OAKLAND HILLS DEDICATION HELD SUNDAY

The life of Christ, portrayed in sculpture work with many other art, architectural and musical features, characterizes the floral and religious gardens which are creating a popular point of interest for the greater Detroit area.

Dedication of the "Oakland Hills Memorial Gardens", corner of Twelve Mile and Novi Roads, was held on Sunday, October 2, at 2:15 p.m. Dominic Zappa, world famed sculptor, heads the art department of Memorial Gardens Association of America, and creates the original designs for the series of sacred memorials on display at the company's 41 cemetery properties throughout the nation.

The 157 acres at Oakland Hills is one of the company's three Detroit properties. The other two are known as Cadillac Memorial Gardens West at 34224 Ford Road, and Cadillac Memorial Gardens East, at Garfield and Clinton River Roads.
