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CAMP - OUT PLANS COMPLETED FOR LIVONIA OUTING

Final preparations are being made for the big Halloween camp out for all fathers and sons of Livonia Township, to be held at Burton Woods, Five Mile near Farmington Road, Saturday and Sunday, October 30 and 31.

The entire program has been planned to include entertaining events and activities for the camping period. Contests, games and demonstrations of every description are scheduled.

Those who are planning to attend should check off the following equipment and provisions to make sure they will have everything they need for the outing. Try to bring a tent for yourself and your neighbor, but if you do not have one, don't let that stop you from attending, as various Scout Troops are loaning their tents. Sleeping gear should include three or more blankets and a cot.

As far as food is concerned, there will be a total of five meals and a snack for the campers, so judge according to the time you plan to stay at camp. Your cooking and eating utensils will depend on the menu you select. Water will be available, but each individual should bring a jug to hold his immediate supply. There is plenty of dead timber about, so bring a knife and hatchet. No guns or alcoholic beverages will be allowed. The camp period will begin at 9:00 a.m. Saturday and continue until 5:00 p.m. Those who find it impossible to attend for the entire period may attend any part of the camp that corresponds with the free time available.

This camp is designed to bring fathers and sons closer together, and give them an outdoor experience they can share together. It is hoped that all will participate, and remain in camp for as much of the period as possible.

when facilities become available. Saxton said. Dial service is scheduled for 1950.

Walpole Lake and Longacre (West Bloomfield) will be the new additions to the Farmington extended calling area which now includes Livonia, Southfield, and the Redford, Garfield and Kenwood 2 central offices of the Detroit exchange.

Calls to these areas by Farmington extended area subscribers will be at the flat monthly rate for that type of service. Local area service, which permits unlimited calls for the flat monthly rate only within the Farmington zone, still is available.

Local area customers will benefit from the inclusion of Walpole Lake and Longacre in the extended calling area even though they do not subscribe to the service. Calls to these areas now will be five cents instead of 10 cents for local area customers.

The rate schedules under which most Detroit suburban exchanges now operate have been standardized on the basis of the calling opportunities within each area.

The order and rate schedule authorizes relatively higher increases in long distance calls, including Farmington, to correct inequities, Saxton said.

"Rates in Farmington have been on the low side for years when compared with other exchanges of like telephone development and calling opportunities," he said.

Residence, local area — individual line, from \$1.75 to \$3; two-party line, \$2.25 (formerly not available); four-party line, from \$1.45 to \$2 (temporary, to be discontinued); rural line, from \$1.50 to \$2 (temporary, to be discontinued).

Residence, extended area — individual line, from \$2.25 to \$3.75; two-party line, from \$2.75 to \$3.25; Business — individual line, from \$2.30 to \$5.50; two-party line, from \$2 to \$4.50 (temporary, to be discontinued); rural line, from \$2.25 to \$3.50 (temporary, to be discontinued); PBX, from \$2.75 to \$3.25.

Extensions — residence, from 50c to 75c; business, from \$1 to \$1.25.

Long distance revenues on calls to Michigan points are increased 6 per cent with the following changes: reduction in the initial calling period (before overtime charges) from 5 minutes to 4 minutes for distances of 10 to 15 miles and to 3 minutes for distances over 15 and up to 30 miles. Increase in overtime charges from the present one-quarter to one-third of the initial period rate. Increase of 5 cents on night and Sunday calls for distances of 45 to 112 miles.
