

### '49 Fishing Rules To Be Unchanged

No major changes in Michigan fishing regulations for 1949 are incorporated in the digest shortly to be issued by the conservation department. 1,700,000 copies of which now are being printed. Because the state legislature must approve more important regulations, the digest remains substantially unchanged in old form. A 13-page folder, the digest will be ready for distribution November 1.

The 1949 season opening on trout streams is April 30, extending through September 11. Bass and bluegill fishermen again will set their lines legally on June 25, the bass season ending, December 31.

### Knolauch Is Named To High USDA Post

Harold C. Knolauch, native of Blissfield, Michigan, has been appointed assistant chief of the Office of Extension Stations. It has been revealed by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Dr. Knolauch, a 1931 graduate of Michigan State College, will be in charge of administration of federal grant funds for research appropriated for use by the state, territorial and Puerto Rico agricultural stations.

The new USDA executive has a master's degree from Rhode Island State College and a Ph.D. from Rutgers University. Dr. Knolauch first joined the government service in 1935 as a member of the research division of the Soil Conservation Service.

### MSC Is Honored On Radio Program

The story of Michigan State College was broadcast to the nation Saturday, October 23, when the U. S. Department of the Army honored the East Lansing college in the first of a new series of "Campus Statues".

The program, aired by Mutual outlets each Saturday at noon, is scheduled to honor a number of great American colleges and universities during the next few months. Michigan State College, which now stands as one of a dozen largest universities of the nation, was selected for first honors in the series.

### Bailey Issues Warning On Rodent Control

As winter comes on, fruit growers are being urged to see that their trees are properly protected against mice and rabbits. County agricultural agent Karl D. Bailey reports that matted grass along fence rows and sod and weeds around trees are good places for these animals to hide.

A number of methods are used for control. Mechanical protectors of wire netting; cleaning sod away and mounding the tree with cinders or gravel; killing mice by means of poison bait; pruning the trees; and painting trunks of trees with repellent.

Killing the mice has proven the most effective. This can be done by use of poison bait, placed along the surface runways, or in the holes in the ground made by mice. The poison bait may be obtained from the Grand Rapids Growers, Grand Rapids, which is the distributor for Michigan.

Hints for using the bait can be found in Extension Bulletin 196, "Protecting Fruit Trees Against Mice and Rabbits", which can be obtained from agent Bailey's office.

Satisfactory control of rabbits is usually possible by the use of a repellent which is applied to the trunk of the trees. A repellent formula is given in the extension bulletin.

Special problems in controlling mice and rabbits that damage fruit trees may be brought to the agents office for advice.
