

## NEW POSTAL RATES TO GO INTO EFFECT BEGINNING JAN. 1

Certain postal rates will be increased, it was announced today by Norman C. Lee, local postmaster, beginning January 1. The new rates, Lee stated, are not expected to affect first class rates, but the air mail rate is one of the classes of mail which will definitely go up.

At the present time the air mail rate is 5c per ounce, but beginning January first the new rate will be 7c per ounce. A limit of eight ounces on air mail will be all that will be allowed, it was disclosed at the same time.

At the present, it has been announced, the increases, while not affecting first class mail, will generally affect most other classes of mailing.

Chief among these will be parcel post rates, registered mail, money orders, postal notes and domestic C.O.D. rates. In most cases the rates will be increased only a fractional amount for each zone rating. The zones will remain the same as heretofore.

However, according to Lee, it is also expected that postal cards which formerly cost a one cent stamp will, beginning January 1, 1949, be increased to two cents.

Where Butter Goes
