This is our chance to pass on the good luck to someone else."

Mr. and Mrs. Kahl have two children of their own, Dana, eight, and James, 16 months. They are renting their home because they have found something closer to Mr. Kahl's work as an accountant at the Ford Motor Company in Highland Park.
