(Continued from Page One) service to neighborhoods now without hospital facilities. Hospital care will be within easy reach of every resident of Greater Detroit, Norton remarked.

4. Enlargement of all participating hospitals to a capacity of more than 100 beds each, and most to at least 200, will result in greater efficiency and economy and will supply increased facilities for a much-needed broadening of advanced training programs for young physicians and surgeons.

Dr. Douglas, chairman of the Detroit Regional Hospital Survey Committee, pointed out that the master plan is based on the findings of a year-long survey of hospital needs and existing services in tri-county Detroit.

Referring to the admissions committee report, he said hospital admissions have almost doubled in the past decade and the percentage of babies born in Detroit hospitals in that period has jumped from 68.3 to 97.7.

Other statistics in the report show that 15 per cent of existing hospital accommodations are in structures considered obsolete, and that 70 per cent of the area's hospital facilities are concentrated in the heart of Detroit, with only 30 per cent serving outlying sections.

The health commissioner expressed emphatic approval of the aims "to relieve dangerous overcrowding, to correct uneven distribution of hospital facilities, to modernize our hospitals and to enlarge them to optimum size."

"This \$19,720,000 program of the Greater Detroit Hospital Fund is realistic in its scope and objective," Dr. Douglas said. "When it is completed, we can expect a voluntary hospital system here that will meet the demands of the community for a long, long time."

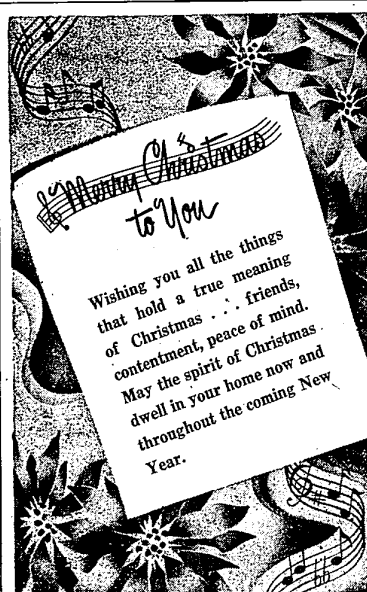
