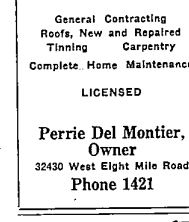

STATE PROFESSOR CALLED AUTHORITY ON LUMBER CAMPS

Despite the fact that he has never been a lumberjack, Dr. F. C. Beck, head of the department of English at Central Michigan College, has become an authority on lumberjack literature. His latest contribution to the field, "Lore of the Lumber Camps," has just been received from the printer. He has made two other major contributions in the form of published material. These are "Lore of Michigan Lumberjacks," and contributions to the "Legends of Paul Bunyon."

Dr. Beck came to the State of Michigan twenty-one years ago to teach English at Central Michigan College. His background was quite remote from that of a lumberjack. He has been a Montana cowpuncher, a Nebraska farm boy, Harvard educated, a public school and college instructor.

The collection of lumberjack literature is one of his primary hobbies and interests, despite the fact that his interests are broad and varied. He attributes his interest in the field to two factors. They are his geographical location and the fact that he studied under two of the world's foremost authorities on the field of folk literature, Dr. Louise Pound of Nebraska and G. L. Kitteridge of Harvard.

"Lore of the Lumber Camps" is the result of some eighteen years of collecting lumberjacks' lore. Considerable material has been gathered for him by his students in the states of Nebraska, Colorado, Wyoming and Michigan. Other contributions have been made by his friends and personal contacts with lumberjacks.

One of his songs "Louie Sand's and Jim McGehe," has been rearranged by a motion picture company and is being used in the movie, "Steve and the Redwoods."

Since he has taken up the hobby Dr. Beck has taken on lumberjacks and their literature in some twenty states. He claims that his hobby isn't too profitable a one, yet he has managed to tour the United States and good deal of Canada by lecturing.

Dr. Beck has served as a master of ceremonies for lumberjack shows with lumberjacks in Chicago, St. Louis, Washington and Philadelphia, Detroit, Cleveland, Indianapolis, New York and Buffalo to mention a few of the larger cities.

State To Map Lakes On Fish Production

With improved fish production as the long run objective, four lake mapping parties will be out on the ice this winter surveying over 50 mostly small and medium-sized lakes. By the end of the year, ice and snow conditions may force changes in the mapping schedules but if conditions are good, additional lakes may be mapped toward the end of the winter.

Physical mapping and sounding through the ice in winter is followed by a biological survey and inventory in the next summer. Information obtained by the crews is needed to properly maintain and improve lakes' game fish production.

Convicted Of Battery, Will Now Serve Sentence

Louis Gennara, Hermansville, has given up his two-year fight to evade a circuit court decision sentencing him for assaulting conservation officer John Bugni. Gennara was first charged in January and convicted in November 1948 of assault and battery. He was sentenced to serve 60 days and pay a fine of \$200 and court costs. He recently surrendered to local sheriff Vescolani.

Fishery Supervisors Get More Training

A two-week stint of inservice training for regional and district fisheries supervisors of the conservation department started in Ann Arbor on January 10. Directed by the department's institute for fisheries research at Ann Arbor, the fish specialists are participating in actual laboratory work coupled with lectures and discussions. Orientation and research and cultural personnel are studying, each others' problems under the recently organized regional set up.

Huge Destruction By Fire Shows Need For Clean Up

Property and resources now are being destroyed by fire in the United States at the fastest rate in history. During the past year, \$62,825,000 went up in smoke, most of it in shopping, buildings, food, and materials and manufactured goods that are in short supply, states the National Board of Fire Underwriters.

This less figure does not begin to include all the other indirect losses caused by the hundreds of thousands of preventable fires that broke out during the year. These other losses include forest and timber, watershed, production losses, business failure, medical expenses, wages, tax values wiped out and fire fighting costs, which are the result of fire.

Much of the fire destruction is the result of the deterioration of heating systems and machinery, and the overloading of electrical circuits. In recent years, shortages of repair parts and manpower have caused this deterioration; hence it is of extreme importance that every householder and every property owner keep close check on his heating equipment, and inspect fuses regularly to be sure that fuses are of proper size. A major factor in most large fires is delay in notifying the fire department. Every citizen should learn the fastest way of calling the fire department from his home, office, school or factory where feasible, automatic detection and alarm systems should be installed, particularly in large establishments.

On Trail of Cholera

Radioactive substances (tracers) are paving the way for agricultural scientists who are trying to learn the cause of cholera, a disorder which causes a plant to lose its green color. They already know that lack of iron and perhaps lack of phosphorus contributes to this condition. According to members of the institute of radiobiology and biophysics at University of Chicago, one of three institutes in a 12 million dollar atomic research program, radioactive iron and phosphorus will help to provide the answer.

Millions of Britons Move Into New Post-War Homes

Britain's post-war building achievements are the biggest, and probably the boldest, in Europe. Since the war Britain has built about 200,000 permanent houses and 140,000 temporary, non-structural homes for almost one million people.

Helped by mild weather during the recent winter, builders worked fast. By the end of December—the latest figures available—they put up more than 17,600 new permanent homes more than in any other month in 1948.

By the end of 1948—building supplies and labor remain steady—Britain will have 230,000 more new permanent houses than there were at the end of 1947. The 1949 total will almost double the 1947 output.

The biggest handicap to housing is the shortage of raw materials, especially lumber, steel and cement. But expert opinion and improvisation are beating the supply bottlenecks. By cutting down on timber and using substitute materials, many of the million houses built with the timber that built only two before the war.

Other new materials such as light alloys and plastics are solving many of the piping and other metal-always problems. Prefabrication has been so vigorously developed that more than 20 types are now on the market. The man responsible for Britain's housing program—Aneurin Bevan, Minister of health, is confident that before this year is over a total of 750,000 new homes will have been reached, unless the acute dollar shortage necessitates further cuts in raw materials.

New Dinosaur Discovery

Fossil bones of a dinosaur have been discovered by the Academy of Natural Sciences of Philadelphia. The bones were found near Sewell, N. J., 15 miles from Philadelphia. The fossils were identified as the remains of a sauropod, the duck-billed dinosaur that lived some 60 million years ago. The dinosaur was 35 feet long. It walked on its hind legs, and inhabited the seashore area (the shoreline then was much nearer Philadelphia than now). Just 20 years ago the academy discovered near Hadfield, N. J., the first dinosaur skeleton to be found in the United States. It was named by Professor Dr. Joseph Leidy, anatomist and paleontologist. The name, from the Greek, means stout lizard.
