Hog Lice And Mange Controlled By Spray

Paster fattening and higher prices are just two of the gains farmers will make if they rid their hogs of lice and mange.

Ray Hutson, head of the entomology department at Michigan State College, says that one spray with benzene hexachloride (BHC) is generally enough to do the job.

Be sure to wait at least 60 days

after spraying before you butcher or send your hogs to market, the specialist warns. If you don't, the meat may have an off-flavor, musty taste. Brood sows should not be sprayed within 30 days of farrowing.

Getting rid of lice helps to make a healthier herd, too, because lice spread swine pox attacks on cutting and growing pigs.

F. F. TUBBS NAMED EDUCATION HEAD OF CONSERVATION UNIT

Appointment of Farley F. Tubbs as the new chief of the conservation department's education division, effective February 1, is announced. Tubbs succeeds C. A. (Percy) Packer, who resigned last September to enter the reforestation business.

A department biologist since 1924, Tubbs assumed new duties several months ago as conservation consultant with the department of public instruction.

Principal in Stanton public schools for six years prior to joining the conservation department, Tubbs was graduated from Central State Teachers and Michigan State Colleges. He came to the department as a game biologist until early 1948 when he was transferred to Roscommon in a supervisory capacity in game management in the northern counties of the lower peninsula. He returned to Lansing last fall to advance the program of conservation education in Michigan public schools.

Announcing the appointment, Director P. J. Hoffmann said: "Tubbs has excellent academic training and is qualified to push forward the department's program of conservation education. In his years with the department he has made thousands of public contacts and is recognized as having broad knowledge of Michigan game affairs."

Franklin and Meteorology
In 1775, when he left London to return to an America that was preparing for the Declaration of Independence, Franklin amused himself during the voyage by testing the temperature of the Gulf Stream as his ship passed over it. During the week of April 26 to May 2, while the vessel travelled along the eastern edge of the stream and then crossed it to colder water, he lowered his thermometer from two to four times each day. He remarked that the water of the stream did not evaporate in the ship's had its own color and that there was more gulf weed in it than in the surrounding water. He suggested that "A vessel from Europe to North America may shorten her passage by avoiding to stem the stream, in which the thermometer will be very useful, and a vessel from America to Europe may do the same by the same means of keeping in it."
