Valley Council will be realized - the dedication of over \$40,000 worth of new camp buildings. Commissioner Hunt, as chairman of the dedication program, has secured the services of the Lt. Governor of the State of Michigan, to preside at the exercises which will be attended by the public and representatives from civic organizations all over Oakland and Macomb Counties.

Saturday evening a Camp fire program is to be presented under the able direction of Skipper Bill DeGrace, who has promised a great show that has ever been presented at a Camp-O-Ree.

Church services will be held for both Catholic and Protestant sects and leaders on Sunday morning.

Swimming at scheduled intervals on the program will be under the direction of the Red Cross swimming instructor, Tom Champion, who also will be the first class swimming tests.

Over a thousand scouts and their leaders are expected to be on hand for the event.

### Fruit Fly Program Gets Early Start

Due to the early warm spring season, cherry fruit fly inspection work has been started this year much earlier than in the past, reports C. A. Boyer, Chief of the Bureau of Plant Industry, Michigan Department of Agriculture.

Working on the project are 22 bureau inspectors, checking emergence cages to detect the time the fruit flies emerge. These men will continue inspecting trees and checking on the fruit until it has been harvested and processed.

In addition to checking for fruit flies, a survey is being made to determine the prevalence of cherry yellows, a serious virus disease present in some Michigan orchards, and to locate the presence of insect hosts such as chokecherry and pincherry, adjacent or in close proximity to cherry orchards. Pincherries are very subject to infection with cherry fruit fly while chokecherry is the host for X-disease, a disease detrimental to peach trees and sour cherries.

With the beginning of the cherry harvest season, the regular field laboratory operated by the Bureau of Chemical Laboratories of the Department will start making Howard Tests of samples to determine whether or not the fruit is infested. If the fruit is found to be infested, it will be destroyed. The project will be materially increased this year to cover virus diseases, to protect Michigan's cherry industry. This is of vital importance, since last year Michigan produced 32 per cent of the nation's sour cherry crop.

### Machine Show At Grass Day Events

Displays of the latest equipment for the harvesting and handling of the crops will be a highlight of the statewide Grass Day programs this June.

All major companies have indicated they will participate, reports Arthur J. Bell, extension specialist in agricultural engineering at Michigan State College. The exhibits will be prepared by local implement dealers in the different areas.

All machinery used in seeding, harvesting, and handling forage crops will be shown. These include balers, forage harvesters, bale loaders, forage wagons, bale elevators, blowers, rakes, mow drivers, tractors, grass seedling equipment, and field choppers.

Several companies have reported they will be showing new equipment for the first time. New designs in forage harvesters, rakes and wagons will be featured.

In 1948 an average of 70 pieces of machinery was displayed at each meeting. This equipment is displayed in the morning and then concentrated in the field in the afternoon.

Factory representatives will be on hand to discuss their machinery with interested farmers.

Bell urges all farmers to attend the Grass Day in their area to learn how improved farm machinery can be used in their farming program. The programs are sponsored by the Michigan State College extension service in conjunction with county agricultural agents and local planning committees.

### Girl Scouts Announce Day Camp Bus Schedule
