

60 MPH Crash Equals 10-Story Fall

What would be your chances of hitting a solid obstruction on the highway at 60 miles an hour — and the odds against your getting out of it unharmed are about the same. "At this speed your chances of being killed, rather than injured, are about eight times greater than they would be if you were traveling at 20 miles an hour," John DeVriendt, said. "Special studies of car accidents show that the higher the speed the greater the chance for death in case of an accident."

Chief DeVriendt discussed these safety rates in connection with the July campaign against excessive speed, which is being conducted with the State Safety Commission as a part of its continuing year-around program on traffic safety.

Emphasis during July, according to Chief DeVriendt, will center on the motorist's personal responsibility for driving at speeds in keeping with the condition of the road, the car, the weather and other factors.

Urge Campers To Use Unfilled State Parks

With a 10 to 25 per cent increase this year in the number of tent and trailer camps in nearly all state parks and recreation areas, the conservation department's park division is urging campers to try less used locations, at Orchard Beach, Devil's Manias, Wilson and Houghton, Houghton near Rogers City, Young near Bayne, Harrisville and Ludington parks.

Most southern Michigan parks which can accommodate campers are filled to capacity, and Grand Haven, Holland, Island Lake and East Tawas camping facilities are expected to be filled by the remainder of the summer.

The six lesser-used parks mentioned offer swimming and also fishing at the locations or close by. Fifteen-day camping permits, which are renewable when parks are not more than half full, can be secured from the park managers. There is no charge for a small amount of electricity where available until when requested.

Michigan had 755,429 registered campers in state parks and recreation areas last year.


