## EDITORIAL

A committee of five teachers, Mr. Charles Greig, Mr. Arthur Mann, Mr. Cassin Ryntek, Mr. Max Miller and Miss Betty Meyers met with superintendent Louis Schmidt last week and set up the rules and regulations concerning the status of the new gym.

The rules were devised to give the gym floor the fullest protection from abuse. The rules will benefit everyone in the school, and have been passed to all teachers to read to their pupils. They are as follows:

1. All school activities in the gym must be cleared through the principal's office.
2. No one is to be on the gymnasium floor with shoes other than regular tennis shoes or sneakers, except in cases of normal walking or dancing.
3. Only those pupils enrolled in the class or out for the activity are to be in the gym unless permission has been granted.
4. There is to be no practice before or after the scheduled times. All activities must be under adult supervision at all times.
5. Pupils are not to use any equipment stored in the gym which is not assigned to them (which includes hand instruments, physical education equipment, etc.)
6. There shall be no gum, candy, or food eaten in the gym during the time of normal school activities.
7. Pupils are to refrain from running on the stage or in the bleachers.
8. Lights are to be used sparingly. During class periods and practices the instructor is responsible for lighting (number of lights used). At all other times the custodians are responsible.
9. Coaches and physical education instructors are responsible for the appearance of the shower rooms.
10. Custodians will mop the showers in rooms and lavatories and treat the floors each week.

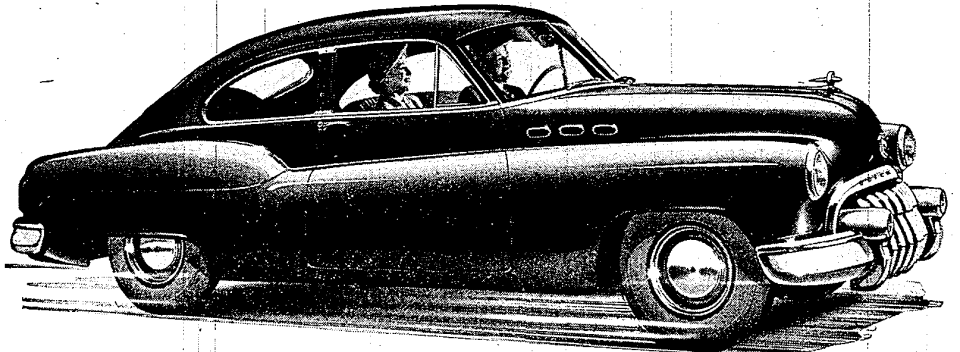
