## Trojans Down D. U. S., 28 - 16

The Clarenceville Trojans celebrated the school's first alumni homecoming game last Friday evening by whipping Detroit University School 28 to 16 for their second win of the season.

The Trojans led the entire game, but the final outcome was much in doubt until the third quarter, when the Trojan defense stopped Detroit with only two points for the period.

The Trojans led 4 to 2 at the end of the first quarter and stretched their margin to four points at the half, leading 12 to 8. Detroit scored six points in the second quarter, but they were in a single period in the game. They tied this output in the final stanza by also scoring six points.

After half time Detroit University School switched from their zone defense to man-to-man defense. The Trojans solved this lead by increasing their defense to eight points, leading 18 to 10 as the third quarter ended.

Taking up where they left off, the Trojans continued their starward defensive tactics and added ten points to their offensive total, widening their margin to 12 points as the game ended 28 to 16 in Clarenceville's favor.

Somewhat of an oddity happened when all the Trojan points were counted on field goals. The Trojans had three chances to score on free throws but were unable to connect on any of them.

Boy Nelson led the Trojans in scoring with eight points. Riggs and Rutilla had 6 each, and Hank Albers and Bob Layland got four points each.

The Clarenceville Reserve squad also added a victory to their record, edging out an 18 - 14 victory over the D. U. S. Reserve squad.

Leading 6 to 4 at the quarter, the Reserves fell behind 14 - 9 at the half.

Starting the second half the Junior Trojans showed a dazzling defensive show, holding the D. U. S. Reserves scoreless the remainder of the game.

Fighting from behind they tied the game in the third quarter and then went on to win 18 to 14.

Jack Faler led the scoring with 8 points to his credit.

**Buckeyes Top First Intramural Standing**
