As a part of the program the 1941 and 1944 bonds, which were paid up in advance, will be burned. The bonds cover the Central School and the first addition of the high school.

Sports Round-Up Set For Saturday

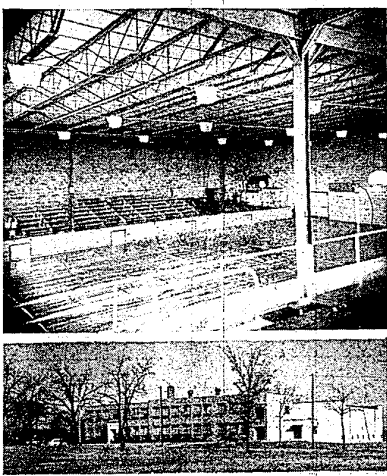
