Mr. Robinson died at St. Joseph Mercy Hospital, Pontiac, January 25, following a cerebral hemorrhage suffered the previous day.

He was born in Marlette, Michigan, on April 23, 1892. Until his health interfered six years ago, he was a foreman at Ford Motor Company.

Mr. Robinson and his wife Ellen, who survives him, resided at 30995 Fargo, Livonia Township. He also leaves one brother, Earl Cooper Robinson of Hamilton, Ontario, and one sister, Mrs. Henry Armstrong of Toronto, Canada.

Funeral services were held from the Spencer J. Hume Funeral Home at 2 p.m. Monday, with Rev. Fred Fisher officiating. Burial services were held under the auspices of Farmington Lodge 151, F. & A. M., with interment in Acadia Park Cemetery.

Joseph M. Maxwell, a resident of Farmington for the past four years, died suddenly Monday morning at the home of his son, Gordon, at 21905 Grand River Avenue.

Mr. Maxwell was born November 2, 1885, in Sarnia, Ontario. He had lived the greater part of his life in Detroit. Mr. Maxwell had been retired from the Ford Motor Company for many years.

Mr. Maxwell resided at the Thayer Funeral Home until Wednesday morning, when funeral services were held at 10 a.m. from Our Lady of Sorrows Church. Interment took place at Holy Sepulchre Cemetery.

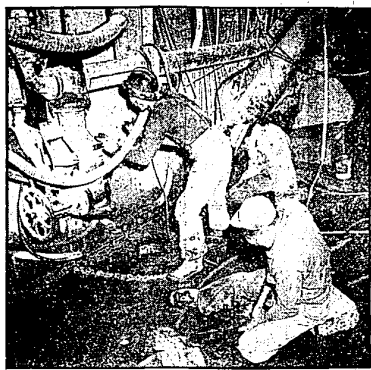

Says H-Bomb Process Known For Decade

Fundamental knowledge of the hydrogen bomb, said to generate more destructive force than atomic energy, has been present in scientific circles for the past decade, according to Dr. Thomas H. Osgood, Michigan State College physicist.

"Scientific people all over the world, including Russia, are familiar with the theoretical basis of the H-bomb," he said. "These principles have for some time been recognized as the most likely source of energy in the sun and other typical stars."

Dr. Osgood, director of the MSC division of mathematics and physical science, also heads the college's atomic energy research program.

MSC Breaks Winter Enrollment Record

Enrollment at Michigan State College stood at a record-breaking 15,755 as late winter term registrations hit the total 422 over the 15,334 figure of last winter, Registrar Robert S. Linton said.

Despite a sharp drop in veteran enrollment, 15,132 regular students signed up for classes and 574 enrolled in short courses, Linton said.

Release Of Million Trout Sets Record

Release of one million legal-size brook, brown and rainbow trout, an annual conservation department goal in recent years, has been achieved with final December plantings.

Fish division hatcheries planted a total of over 2,652,000 trout of all sizes, 38,000 of which were lake trout, included were 1,083,000 legal-size fish, 167,000 sub-legal and 317,000 fingerlings.

Northern lower peninsula trout lakes and streams received bulk of the crop. Besides the 1,211,000 released in that section of the state,

fish planters stocked 484,000 in upper peninsula and 257,000 in southern Michigan trout waters. Closed season now prevails on brook, brown and rainbow but lake trout may be taken through the ice in the few upstate inland lakes where they are present as well as on Great Lakes and connecting waters — St. Marys, St. Clair and Detroit Rivers.

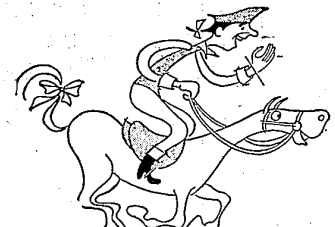
