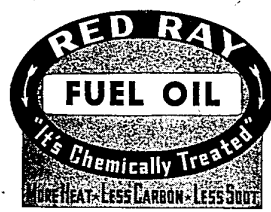

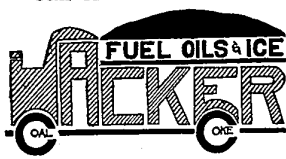

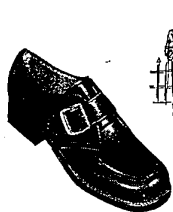

The cards were found and the marks checked. The two sisters flunked history and were forbidden to go out on their date, but Junior surprised them all and passed his subjects.

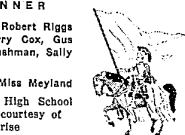
The skits were directed by the sponsor of the Freshman class, Mrs. Simpson.

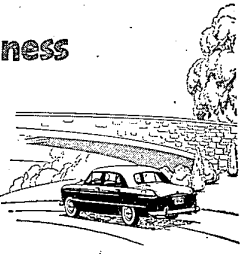
